Coming With Wife—Mrs. Petrolmen has received word that G. A. Greenleaf, father of Guy Greenleaf, who is now in the county jail on charges in connection with the death of Erna Knorr, will arrive here on the Alliance tomorrow. He is accompanied by Guy Greenleaf's wife and child.

News to Sengstacken—The Coquille Sentinel last week printed a story to the effect that Henry Sengstacken is behind a project for erecting a first class 3-story hotel there, adjoining the Farmers' and Merchants' Bank. Mr. Sengstacken, when asked about it today, said that the story was all news to him.

Buy's Property—W. H. Burghagen today sold his Bunker Hill property through the Stutsman agency, to W. C. Craig and wife, who conduct the Bunker Hill boarding house, for \$12. Mr. Craig recently bought the Rourke property near it. Mr. Burghagen expects to leave soon for Rainier, Oregon, where his daughter has bought a fine ranch.

Wed in Oakland—Mrs. Swanson of Eastside has received word that her daughter and husband have just returned from their honeymoon trip and will make their home in Oakland. Miss Esther Swanson, formerly a clerk in Stafford's, and Gary Doty were married February 17. Mr. Doty travels through this section in the interests of a dental supply house.

Names Home Millicoma—A. E. Pollexfen, well known on Coos Bay but at present a resident of San Francisco, is building a beautiful bungalow summer home at Mill Valley, Calif., which he has named Millicoma. The name was the result of a suggestion of E. W. Kammerer, who has just returned from a trip to San Francisco. While there he met Mr. Pollexfen who told him of his new home and said all these summer places were named and asked Mr. Kammerer for a suggestion and Millicoma was the result.

Who Is He—Marshal Carter today received a letter from D. G. MacLean, probation officer at Sallinas, Calif., asking information about a young man who was taken up recently for vagrancy. He says the lad has been going there by the name of Frank Moore, but in a letter found on him from his mother, he is addressed as "James." The lad won't give his name but the letter indicates that his father is an invalid, his mother subject to heart failure, and a sister is about to be married. The family

is said to own a ranch in this vicinity. Marshal Carter has not yet located the parents. The boy is said to be about eighteen years old and to have left Oregon about August 14, 1912.

No Damage—Although driftwood lodged against the long trestle of the Smith-Powers road, near Myrtle Point, no particular damage is reported to have been done by it. Chief Engineer Haines was unable to come home yesterday on account of the high water, remaining to watch the bridges.

Three Arrested—Marshal Carter yesterday rounded up three loggers who insisted on celebrating too boisterously. They were Almer Green, who put up \$10 cash bail, and Mike Link and Walter Smith, who put up \$5 apiece. All of them failed to show up today and their bails were declared forfeited.

Dies in Coquille—Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. Daisy Holland, formerly Miss Wickham, of consumption, at Coquille, Saturday. Her sister, Mrs. Edward Mosher, resides in Marshfield. Mrs. Holland's husband, the late "Bud" Holland was for a number of years connected with the Blanco bar.

Baseball Meeting—President Kern of the Coos County Baseball league has called a meeting to be held in Coquille Thursday at 11 o'clock. It is understood that the Bay towns will let Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon fight out the controversy over the number of hired players. It is possible that a four team league may be agreed upon.

Dredge for Railway—Herman Larson's dredge on the Siuslaw is cutting a new channel there so that the Southern Pacific will have only one bridge to build at Acme instead of two. There was a second channel which might have required a draw-bridge but by dredging the company will be able to avoid this. Engineer E. L. Robinson is at Gardiner doing some survey work for the other Larson dredge and is expected home Saturday.

Holden's Idea a Success—J. L. Koontz yesterday tested out Dave Holden's sand pulleymobile and found it to be a success, climbing hills, running good over the sand on the North Marshfield fill, etc. It makes good speed but should have more power than the 26-horsepower in the auto it was tried out on. Next Sunday, a trial trip will be made to Gardiner. It now looks as though the machine would be a success in every way and Dave Holden will reap a big profit from the idea.

To Change Ferry—Judge John F. Hall went to Coquille today to hold a term of probate court. Tomorrow, a special session of the county commissioners will be held to award some road improvement contracts. It is not expected that the contract for repairing the Eastside approach to the ferry will be awarded, owing to the strong movements to have the ferry landings changed. The Eastside and Marshfield city councils will probably consider the matter tonight.

Fletcher Heir Case—Judge Coke has overruled a demurrer in the case of the heirs of the late Charles W. Fletcher vs. Miner & Wordes. The Fletcher heirs seek to recover 160 acres of timberland in the Blue Ridge section. This case is similar to the one wherein they seek to recover the E. Seaman property at Elrod and Fourth. It seems that Judge Hall, as administrator of the Fletcher estate, sold the 160 acres of timber to D. C. McCarty and Mr. Hutchison for \$600 and they later sold it to Miner, who sold a half interest to Worden. The tract is now quite valuable. The overruling of the demurrer holds the administrator's sale void. The Seaman case differs in that the Fletcher property was sold by Mrs. Young, who was Fletcher's second wife.

STEADY GROWTH IN FIRST ADDITION.
