NEW BOX FACTORY.

New Plant at Bullards Nearly Ready For Operation.

The Bandon World says: "Representatives of the World visited the factory of the Coquille River Mfg. Co., at Bullards, Tuesday, and found that model institution almost ready to commence operations and by the time this story reaches our readers the wheels will be turning."

"The factory is 52x100 feet, well and substantially built and the interior filled with the most compact and modern machinery made for the manufacturing of boxes, which will be driven by motors of approximately 120 horsepower. One of the commendable features noticeable is the convenient arrangement of the whole plant, no unnecessary handling of material and no blocking of runways or passages.

"The mill will have a capacity of 20,000 feet of lumber per day and will furnish employment for twenty men. The company now has 800,000 feet of lumber in its yards and a market has been found for the entire output.
A practical outlet for the refuse of the factory has been arranged. A bulkhead has been built around land adjoining the plant and a conveyor carries the refuse into it, where it will be leveled by the action of the tide."

ELECTION IN BANDON.

City Council Will Submit Waterworks And Other Questions June 9.

The Bandon World says: "An ordinance was passed calling the special election June 9th, to vote on special measures.

An ordinance incorporating one of the measures to be submitted to the people at the coming election was declared by ordinance and is as follows: To authorize the city council to issue and sell interest-bearing bonds in the amount of \$12,000 to equip the city of Bandon with adequate fire fighting apparatus.

A resolution was passed appropriating \$300 for the purpose of erecting a fire house directly across the street from the city hall.

MORE SKIN GRAFTING.

Loggers Contribute Fifty Pieces for Rol Anderson.

CULLINGS OF COQUILLE

Coos County Seat News as Told by The Sentinel.

Machinery for the Charm, a new river boat, has arrived and the craft will be ready to cut the waters of the Coquille about May 15.

P. E. Drane received a telegram from his daughter, Mrs. B. F. Lawrence, whose home is at Indianapolis, saying they had escaped the calamities which had befallen that section.

J. A. Colomb, of Louisiana, arrived in Coquille this week and will spend some months in the logging camps of the Smith-Powers company in this vicinity for the purpose of gaining a knowledge of the industry. Mr. Colomb's father is an extensive manufacturer of lumber in the southern state. At present the young man is watching the modus operandi of Scaler Kelley.

George Herbert, a veteran of the Civil War, is in the Grayce Hospital in this city, suffering from a complication of physical ailments. He is in his 83rd year. It is supposed that the old gentleman has a brother residing somewhere in the Willamette valley, and an effort is being made to locate him.

DOLLAR AT COQUILLE

Prominent Lumberman Wants Bandon Harbor Improved.

The Coquille Sentinel prints the following concerning a talk made before the Ko-Keel Club there by Capt. Dollar, of the Dollar Steamship and Lumber Company.

"Speaking of the Panama Canal, Mr. Dollar considered that its completion would work incomprehensible good for the development of the Pacific Northwest, putting it, practically speaking, in direct touch with the Atlantic seaboard and European markets. But that which most directly interested Coquille river people from the standpoint of navigation, was Mr. Dollar's opinion concerning the creation of a Port Commission for the Lower Coquille. He thought this a decidedly important step, and promised to lend his influence in securing an adequate appropriation from Congress for deepening the bar channel, removing the pinnacle rocks from inside the harbor entrance, and dredging the river. The depth of water on the bar is now ten feet, which permits of taking but half a load of lumber by the Grace Dollar from the mills. Were there 12 or 14 feet on the bar the Coquille river business would be greatly enhanced, and much of the timber which ultimately must go out via Coos Bay would go by this route. 'Give us 26 feet of water on the bar,' he said, directing his remark to Mr. E. E. Johnson, and we will send to your mills our China vessels.' Which means that we would be placed in position to ship direct to that country. Mr. Dollar urged the creation of a Port Commission without delay, showing the advantages to be gained by such organization."

BASEBALL IN VALLEY

Coquille and Myrtle Point Concede to Three Imported Men.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "There has been a sort of get-together and Coquille is practically assured that it will be taken into the fold on a compromise proposition, it and Myrtle Point granting that three outside players be allowed those teams that desire to enter the outside player business. A meeting was held at Myrtle Point last Monday and also in this city and this was agreed upon, both towns being desirous of getting into the league. North Bend wanted two, or at the most, three players, and there is no doubt that upon reconsideration that city will be with the valley ballplayers. This will leave the proposition up to Marshfield and Bandon, which are in the minority. Owing to the great expense attached to visiting Bandon, the transportation facilities not being the best for the other towns, there would be little sorrow were this team lost in the shuffle."

WHERE IS EDWARDS?

Aged Man Suddenly Disappears From Coquille Hotel.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "A well dressed man, aged 65 or 70 years old, registered at the Hotel Baxter on March 25 as 'I. A. Edwards, Klamath Falls, Or.'" On the 28th he disappeared and has not been seen or heard of since. He left considerable baggage at the hotel and also a complete cook's outfit of knives, cleavers, aprons, etc. The hotel people, fearing that some mishap had befallen the old gentleman, would appreciate any information concerning his whereabouts."

FOR BIG CELEBRATION

Coquille Making Plans for Celebrating Glorious Fourth.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Independence Day will probably be appropriately observed in Coquille this year, and from present indications Myrtle Point will join in doing the proper. Mayor Morrison has received assurance from our neighbors that if Coquille is going to celebrate it will forego that pleasure, inasmuch as it held the boards on July 4 of last year."
