Big Shipment—During the month of March, San Francisco reports that 10,845,000 feet of lumber was received from Coos Bay ports, considerably more than was received from any other three ports along the Pacific coast.

Dairy Increase—H. E. Bessey of the Coos Bay Creamery reports that the ranchers along the river are now supplying about 8,000 pounds of milk per day and he expects to increase this to about 25,000 pounds per day later in the season.

**FERRY PLAN IS LAID ON TABLE**

**Proposed Change in Service Does Not Meet Approval of Judge Hall.**

That the plan of having the Ferry Transit ply from the mouth of Mill Slough to a new slip at Eastside near the mouth of Isthmus Inlet is considered impracticable by Judge Hall, one of the county commissioners. The petitions for the change were presented to the county court at Coquille yesterday by Councilman Albrecht and the commissioners simply continued the matter. However, no contract was awarded for repairing the long wharf from Eastside to the present ferry landing.

Judge Hall said today that it was asking too much to try and have the Ferry Transit ply such a distance, or to accommodate the mill men. He said it would be almost as reasonable to ask the county to provide one between here and North Bend. In addition to this, he said that the Transit would be almost unmanageable at times on such a run as is proposed between Mill Slough and the mouth of Isthmus Slough. He said that if Eastside would build a slip directly opposite the mouth of Mill Slough, it might be changed.

Judge Hall was under the impression that the application was to operate the Transit part of the time on the present run and part of the time on the new course.

There wasn't much else of importance before the commissioners except some routine road matters. J. J. Burns was awarded the contract for planking 3,700 feet of road along the North Coquille in Supervisor Hol-verstott's district.

The commissioners also awarded the contract for printing the foreclosure notices in the delinquent tax sale matters for ten cents per description and ten cents per line for each publication.
