FARMERS ORGANIZING IN OREGON.

The following is taken from an article entitled "Businesslike Commun-ity Farming," published in the cur-rent issue of Farm and Fireside: "One of the best demonstrations

of the businesslike attitude of the Oregon mind is the East Gaston As-sociation of Washington county in the Willamette Valley, about twenty-five miles south of Portland. The Asso ciation embraces a rich farm area of about seventy-five square miles. The genius of the scheme is Mr. W. K. Newell, president of the Association, which includes about fifty farmers.

They voted to raise the same kind of stock. They at once proceeded, about three years ago, to raise only Holstein cattle, to buy, in common, high-standard bulls. Some got mon, high-standard bulls. Some got registered heifers, and all cows had the Holstein strain, no other bulls being used.

"On the same principle they se-lected two breeds of hogs—Berk-shires and Jersey Reds—and worked out all that did not all that did not have one or the other of these strains "They also settled on one breed of sheep , and for poultry they raised
