**Aided in Wreck**—Captain Robert Farley, a former Coos Bay man and brother of August Farley and Jack Farley of Marshfield, was one of those who made heroic efforts to rescue the men off the schooner Mimi in the wreck near Bay City. Captain Farley is head of the Garibaldi Life Saving Station.

**Unusual Trip**—Karl Menke of Bay City is making preparations to start on an unusual trip from Coos Bay to Brookings, the new lumber town on the Chetco River. He has arranged a small cart with bicycle wheels to carry his outfit and will take a kodak and make pictures along the route. He will go via Coquille, Bandon, Port Orford and Gold Beach.

**Had Narrow Escape**—Archie Kruse of the Prosper Shingle mill is in Marshfield on business. He reports that the slide at Prosper the other night almost crushed four men in the bunkhouse, a vast quantity of mud from the cliff toppling over and crushing the building. The Prosper mill is still closed down, the slide having buried some of the boilers.

**Relative Perished in Wreck**—One of the most interested of Marshfield readers of the particulars of the Mimi wreck was N. H. McMillan of the Union Meat Co. Captain Crowe, one of the victims of the Mimi, who perished when the vessel turned turtle, was the husband of Mr. McMillan's cousin. When Mr. McMillan was in Portland, he made his home at Captain Crowe's residence.

**Remain on Bay**—Mrs. L. K. Balingier stated today that she had decided to remain on Coos Bay. Relatives in California and elsewhere have been urging her to come and make her home with them but she has decided not to do so. She will resume her musical work immediately and also resume instruction in her former studio at 237 South Broadway in a few days.

**Had Anniversary**—Yesterday marked the fifth anniversary of Chief Engineer Quinn of the Nann Smith on that vessel. Last evening, he received congratulations from many, on the fine record the vessel had made. The Nann Smith has 600 horsepower less than the new Adeline Smith, which enables the latter boat to make the run between here and San Francisco in about four hours less time.

Jones, Andrew Storgard, R. E. Pinegor, George Rotnor, Jas. Watt and Wm. Warren.

**Wed Today**—The marriage of Miss Kathryn Marie Dyer and David Nathan Bunch will take place today at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward E. Dyer, on Daniels Creek. The young people are well known here and a host of friends will unite in extending best wishes. They will reside on Daniels Creek. Mr. Dyer, who is foreman for E. G. Perham, arrived here to attend the big event from Medford where he has had charge of construction of the bridge for Mr. Perham.

**Case Decided**—The jury in the case of Brusckie vs. Conkright in Justice Pennock's court yesterday afternoon brought in a verdict of \$50 for the plaintiff. Prior to the case, Conkright offered Brusckie \$56.50, one-half of his claim of \$125 which Brusckie claimed was due him for locating Conkright on a homestead, the latter contending that he only got 80 acres instead of 160 acres. Brusckie also has to pay the costs which amount to about \$36, leaving him only \$14 with which to pay his attorney fee. Tom Bennett represented Brusckie and Arthur K. Peck represented Conkright.

**Bandon Case**—Judge Coke in chambers yesterday denied the demurrer of the plaintiff to the answer in the case of May L. Walker vs. the city of Bandon. This case involves the old trouble over assessments for the improvement of Atwater street there, the plaintiff seeking to enjoin the city from selling her property to force the collection. The street work was completed in 1909 but the matter has been hanging fire since then. It seems that the city first

ordered side walks laid along the street but Mrs. L. Walker protested, but about the same time the protest was filed the city took a new start and had the whole street improved instead of the sidewalks being simply put in.

**Alliance in Today**—The Alliance arrived in late today from Portland and will sail tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock for Eureka.

**Ask for Bids**—The Eastside city council at its last meeting decided to go ahead with the street improvements there and instructed Recorder Leaton to ask for bids. Ten days will be allowed for property owners to ask for the privilege of taking out bonds instead of paying their assessments in cash.
