mittee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last evening a resolution was adopted asking the Coos County Commissioners to appropriate \$2500 for the establishment of an experiment farm in Coos county Oregon Agricultural Extension Department. It is understood that the State would appropriate a similar amount. The resolution was introduced by Senator Smith, who se-cured the passage of a bill in the last Legislature permitting the extension of the experimental stations. A committee of two will take the matter up with the Commissioners

There was considerable discussion as to an advertising campaign. Alva-Doll had a letter from the Southern Pacific on the community advertising plan which stated that it would require about \$1500 to carry out that project. The committee thought this was too much just now, but that it might be taken up later. In the meantime, it was suggested that some small advertising matter be issued. I. S. Kaufman will be added to the advertising committee.

I. S. Smith and Dr. Leslie were added to the soliciting committee, onsisting of A. J. Mendel, George Rotnor and Ivy Condron, to secure additional funds for the work.
