

ADICAL are some of the changes that are being made in the tariff bill proposed by the ratic congress. The business democratic congress. The business of the country has been adjusted upon the basis of a protective tariff, and some of the industries will require time for readjustment. Especially will the west feel the influence of the change if the bill goes through as it is proposed. The sheep owner, the lumberman and the sugar planter will be especially affected.

The new federal income tax will in a great measure make up the deficit that the reduction of the tariff will create, and already Wall street has been figuring on just how much each of the men of money will have to "loosen up" each year to meet this new demand of Uncle Samuel. John D. Rockefeller heads the list with an annual contribution of \$2,000,000, while William Rockefeller will have to come through with \$800,000. Others of the big fellows whose taxes will run into the bundred thousand mark are Andrew Carnegle, \$600, 080; Estate of Marshall Field, \$240.
