PORTLAND—Rev. Filmore Tanner, pastor of the Sillwood Nazarene church, died very suddenly at the home of a neighbor, where he had been attending a meeting.

PORTLAND—The interstate bridge committees of Clark and Multnomah counties have directed Ralph Modjeski to prepare plans for a bridge to span the Columbia between Portland and Vancouver, at an estimated cost of \$1,200,000.

THE DALLES—John E. Golt, ex-county surveyor of Wasco, died at his home here after a lingering illness with Bright's disease.

PORTLAND—Tuesday, April 22, was set by the bridge committee of the city executive board, for the formal opening of the new Broadway bridge.

THE DALLES—Sheriff Levi Christian has left for Huntington to bring back to this place William Clark and Ed Gagnier, who are wanted for at attempting to rob the Mosier Valley Bank at Mosier.

Coos county will erect a hospital building and barn at the county infirmary farm, four miles from Coquille, and the structure will be completed and ready for occupancy by Sept. 1 next. BLACK SAND MINING.

Claim New Machine Is Proving a Success Near Bandon.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "L. R. Ferbrache left for Portland, carrying with him samples of gold and platinum mined by machine from the black sands on the coast three miles below Bandon. The machine in operation there is the invention of William Bedell of North Yakima, and he and Mr. Ferbrache own a controlling interest in the company manufacturing and placing them on the market. It is for the purpose of shipping three additional machines to this coast that Mr. Ferbrache is in Portland."

"Forty tons of sand per day were handled for six consecutive days on a recent trial run, the sand running from \$3 to \$10 per ton in gold and platinum, the division between the two metals being about even. In this run a substance heavier than platinum was found in smaller quantities, the nature of which the miners are at a loss to determine. Samples have been taken to Portland for assay."
