"All the mills are running full time and the box factory has just started operation: again.

"In addition to the regular activ ity, the city has many matters un der headway. The opening of the street there to connect up the two sections of the town has been prac tically arranged, the last to sign be ing the lodge of which I am one o the trustees. I have agreed to i and we are now waiting on one of the trustees who is away but whe is certain to approve of it.

"When they take the duty of wool, 1 am looking for even morprosperous times in my woolen mil-I now ship in all of the raw wool use. At no time in the past si months have 1 been able to kee within \$40,000 of the orders or Part of the time I had t hand. work a night shift and for a time had to close down because I couldn' get fuel through. Cheap fuel is on of the factors in our success. I us mill refuse which is good and get i for about 85 cents for a cord and ; half which would cost \$10 or mor in the east. Then, too, we have th best water for putting in the rich deep colors. An analysis show that there are only one or two place in the United States where wate can be obtained which will equa the Bandon water.

'The city will hold a special eler tion in June to take over the water works there. Many street and mu nicipal improvements are als planned."


