TITANIC VICTIMS SEEK DAMAGES

Owners of Vessel Held Responsible For Disaster.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The federal district court dismissed the petition of the owners of the Titanic for a limitation of liability. The court held that the company's liability is to be determined by the law of Great Britain, which would make the owners of the Titanic liable for about \$2,000,000.

Six Hundred and fifty-one claims for damages, aggregating \$16,600,000, have been filed in the federal district court here against the Oceanic Steam and Navigation company for the loss of life in the Titanic disaster.

Coquille Valley Towns Plan to Erect Big Sign Here.

The Coquille Sentinel in a writup of the Commercial club there says: "Mr. Lamb presented the matter of placing a sign in the mud flats on Coos Bay, believing that many travelers would be directed to the Coquille Valley thereby. He thought that such a guide would not only prove valuable to the Coquille but to Bandon and Myrtle Point as well, and suggested that the matter be taken up with the commercial clubs of those cities. NO MORE "PORT" OR "STARBOARD" IN NAVY

Fars Must Hereafter Say Left and Right, Just Like Ordinary Land Lubbers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—Two bits of sea talk dear to the hearts of all old salts were condemned by Secretary Daniels abolishing the designations "port" and "starboard" and replacing them with "left" and "right" in the everyday parlance of land lubbers.

The change was indorsed by the General Board, which, in a statement explaining the reason for the change, said: "It is thought if a search is made for terms that will indicate exactly what is to be done and that are familiar from childhood that all that may become steersmen, more appropriate terms than 'right or left' cannot be selected. Wheelright or wheelleft or, simply the order, right to left, in a direction to the man at the wheel which can be instantly and accurately executed. These orders also accord with the motion of the arm and hand when used in conning ships."
