TO GO AHEAD ON TERMINAL

Directors Decide to Resume Construction Pending Negotiations With S. P.

At a meeting of the directors of the Terminal Railway this afternoon, General Manager Chandler was instructed to immediately resume construction of the line on North Front street and to complete it as quickly as possible. This section is the heaviest construction they have and will necessitate driving piling.
It was also decided to call for the unpaid stock subscriptions to resume construction in order to complete the line within the time specified in their franchise.
C. A. Smith made a report of his negotiations with Vice-President Calvin of the Southern Pacific about turning over the steam line franchises. He said that these negotiations are not yet completed.
The Redondo will bring three carloads of steel rails next week, which will be sufficient to complete track laying to the northern city limits.

APPOINTMENTS BY SIMPSON

North Bend Mayor Announces Official Selections—Council Proceedings.

At a meeting of the North Bend city council last evening, Mayor Simpson announced his appointments for the current year as follows:

City Attorney—John G. Mullen.
Chief of Police—E. P. Anderson.
Fire, water and light committee—H. G. Kern, J. G. Horn and L. F. Falkenstein.

Streets and sewers—Dr. Bartle, H. G. Kern and L. F. Falkenstein.
Finance—Geo. D. Mandigo, J. F. Grubbs and J. G. Horn.

Edward Hobson was requested by the mayor to continue doing special city engineering until the time arrived when he could appoint regularly.

Mayor Simpson said that he would announce the appointment of a night watch at the next meeting and that the present officer R. C. Holmes, would continue until then. Whether he meant that a new night watch would be appointed or Holmes reappointed was not certain.

Special Election Soon.
The special election in North Bend to pass on the bond issue and charter amendments there will be held April 29 and the council adjourned to last night to meet again April 30 to canvass the vote. The judges of the special election will be Peter Loggie, J. W. Grout and Archie Phillips; and the clerks, C. E. Maybie, C. A. Nollner and J. G. Mullen.

Routine Business.
Stannard and Richardson were ordered paid \$600 monre on their contract for preparing grades, etc., for the north portion of the city. This leaves \$200 unpaid.

An ordinance adopting an official bench mark at Washington and Sherman as a base for city grades passed its first reading.

An ordinance establishing the grades proposed by Engineer Richardson for all the streets in the north half of the city, except Virginia avenue, was read the first time.

Mayor Simpson was empowered to close a contract with Engineer Richardson to prepare plans and specifications for improving the south portion of the city, the cost not to exceed \$700.

An appeal for aid for the citizens of Ralston, Neb., struck by the recent cyclone, was referred to Editor McDaniels to raise a public subscription for them.

Messrs. Grubbs, Mandigo and Falkenstein were appointed to designate the precinct lines in North Bend. Three or four voting precincts will be established to conform with the law, the action being requested by Judge Hall.

The special fund provided in order to pay cash for labor and the salaries of city employes, was increased by the transfer of \$3,000 to it from the general fund.

Straighten Harbor Line.
Mayor Simpson was requested to take up with the Port of Coos Bay Commission a plan for straightening the harbor line in front of the North Bend public wharf. There is an angle in the harbor line there and it is proposed to improve it by making the harbor line a straight line between where California and Washington intersect it.
