

# Largest Ship in the World

VESSEL THAT WILL CARRY 3790 PASSENGERS IS LAUNCHED IN THE CLYDE AT GLASGOW BY THE CUNARD LINE.

GLASGOW, April 24.—The largest vessel in the world, the Cunard liner Aquitania, was successfully launched at the yards of her builders, John Brown and Company of Clydebank, Scotland, of the steamship company and hundreds of other spectators were assembled to see the great ship slide down the ways and take her initial plunge in the waters of the Clyde.

The Aquitania will have a displacement slightly in excess of 50,000 tons, or about 10,000 more tonnage than the White Star liner Olympic, the largest vessel now in service. The dimensions of the Aquitania are 900 feet length and 85 feet beam, and she is to have a speed of 23 knots. In her present condition, without engines or boilers, she weighs more than a fully armed battleship. Her interior furn-

ishings and decorations are planned on the most lavish scale, and she will in every way merit the descriptions of a floating palace. The latest safety devices will be installed and she will carry life-boats sufficient to accommodate all of her passengers and crew.

This ship will have accommodations for 550 first class passengers, 740 second class, and 2400 steerage passengers. Her average speed of 23 knots in ordinary weather will land her passengers on Monday night at Fishguard on the eastward trip and early Friday in New York on the outward trip from Liverpool. One of the vessel's unique features will be a completely equipped theater. It is said that a theatrical company with a repertoire of plays will be provided for the ship by a New York manager.

### FEEDING CHICKS.

Department of Poultry Husbandry Tells What to Give Them.

CORVALLIS, Or., April 24.—"Rolled oats of good quality make a very good first feed for chickens," says the O. A. C. poultry husbandry department. "Bread crumbs or stale bread soaked in milk and squeezed dry, is also an excellent first feed. Another good feed for the first few days or a week is a raw egg mixed with bran and a little shorts or middlings and fed in a crumbly condition twice a day. Any of those three feeds may be fed twice a day, with in addition raked wheat and cracked corn.

Until the chicks have learned to eat, the food should be given on clean sand. After a couple of days the cracked wheat and corn should be fed in chaff, so as to make the chicks scratch. Increase the depth of the chaff as they grow older. After the first week discontinue bran and egg, or the bread and milk and feed in its place a mash of bran and shorts or bran and middlings with ground corn in the proportions of about three of bran to one of middlings and one of corn. If the ground corn is not available at reasonable prices, finely ground wheat may be substituted and a little later finely ground oats. Add a pinch of salt to the mixture and enough milk or water so that it will mix to a crumbly consistency.

Feed just as much of this as they will clean up readily in an hour or less, and give them one feed a day. Continue the cracked grains in the chaff until they are about six weeks old when whole wheat may be fed. Do not allow the soft food to remain in the feeding troughs after the chicks have had all they will eat. A little dish of dry middlings is a good cure for ordinary diarrhoea. A dish of charcoal should be kept before them all the time.

After the feeding of the egg is discontinued give them beef scraps. That should be kept in a box or hopper all the time where they can help themselves. The feeding should be done in such a way that the chicks will be active and busy most of the day. Give them as much range as possible on fresh ground. They must have plenty of green food and grit at all times, and their brooding coop kept clean and free from mites.

### AMBASSADOR BRICE QUILTS.

British Diplomat Leaves Post in Washington After Long Service.

He will study conditions in China, thence home by way of Siberia.

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### LARSON NOW A JOLLY TAR.

Adjutant-General Finzer Appoints Portland Man to Naval Militia.
