FEEDING CHICKS.

Department of Poultry Husbandry Tells What to Give Them.

CORVALLIS, Or., April 24.— Rolled oats of good quality make a very good first feed for chickens,"

stale bread soaked in milk and squeezed dry, is also an excellent first feed. Until the chicks have learned to

at, the food should be given on lean sand. After a couple of days he cracked wheat and corn should be fed in chaff, so as to make the hicks scratch. Increase the depth of the chaff as they grow older. After the first week discontinue oran and egg, or the bread and milk oran and shorts or bran and midd-lings with ground corn in the pro-portions of about three of bran to ne of middlings and one of corn. if the ground corn is not available it reasonable prices, finely ground vheat may be substituted and a lit-le later finely ground oats. LARSON NOW A JOLLY TAR. Adjutant-General Finzer Appoints Portland Man to Naval Militia.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25—"Has the Japanese situation become so alarming as all that?" was the first answer made by J. Fred Larson to Adjutant-General Finzer, when Finzer notified him of his appointment as a Lieutenant-Commander in the Oregon Naval Militia.

"I've had some naval experience," he said, "and I suppose I ought to get along all right, especially since now. in the phraseology of the navy, one does not have to worry about 'fore' and 'aft' and 'port' and 'starboard. It is merely a matter of 'right' and 'left,' and I suppose if you want to go below, you call it the basement in the modern man of war."
