NEW GAS PLANT FOR MEDFORD

Medford Men Think They Can Put
 Product on Market Cheap.

MEDFORD, Ore., April 24.—A
 new gas plant will be operated in
 Medford to compete with the Oregon
 Gas & Electric Company according
 to present plans. W. J. Hills and
 Dr. E. H. French are behind the
 deal. The present company has asked
 whether or not it could prevent the
 entrance of a competing corporation
 when it was losing money.
 According to Mr. Hills there are
 1,000,000 tons of low grade coal al-
 ready blocked out a few miles from
 the city and each ton will yield 10,
 000 cubic feet of gas.
 "By using this coal we can put
 dollar gas on the market," said Mr.
 Hills, "whereas the present price in
 Medford is from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a
 thousand."

APPROVE PLAN OF ADVERTISING

Chamber of Commerce Adopts
 Southern Pacific System—
 Brick Plant Indorsed.

At a meeting of the executive
 committee of the Marshfield Cham-
 ber of Commerce this morning, the
 report of the special committee favor-
 ing the taking up of the Southern
 Pacific's "Community Plan of Ad-
 vertising," was approved; the com-
 mittee instructed to go ahead with
 it. The project will call for the
 expenditure of about \$1500, but it
 will provide for the issuance of
 many thousands of pamphlets, the
 sending here of special advertising
 write-up men and photographers and
 advertising of Coos Bay in the Sun-
 set Magazine for a year. The money
 can be paid in monthly installments
 of \$1000, only \$400 having to be
 paid down.

Pending this, the committee de-
 cided to go ahead and print about
 2500 copies of a new booklet for
 distribution at once.

Brick Plant Proposition.
 The committee also discussed at
 some length J. E. Walling's project
 for putting in a brick plant here.
 Mr. Walling wants \$22,000 of a
 \$25,000 company to be raised here,
 he furnishing \$3,000 and taking the
 management of it at \$250 per
 month. He said he had demon-
 strated by tests that the clay here
 would make good brick.

Following a discussion of it, the
 committee adopted a resolution stat-
 ing that they would co-operate in
 establishing a brick plant here, that
 they were certain there was a field
 here for it, and they would render
 such assistance as they could to Mr.
 Walling in getting it started.

SENATOR LANE FAVORS WOMEN

Oregon Senator Argues in Be-
 half of National Suffrage,
 Telling That Women Always
 Aid in Fight for Right.

SENATE TO ACT.
 (By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, April 24.—
 Members of the Senate Woman
 Suffrage Committee virtually
 have decided that one of the
 several resolutions before the
 committee to amend the consti-
 tution to give women the bal-
 lot will be favorably reported
 at the present session.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Sen-
 ators Chamberlain and Lane ap-
 peared before the woman suffrage
 committee of the Senate along with
 other Senators and Representatives
 from the Pacific Coast to present
 arguments in favor of a resolution
 proposing an equal suffrage amend-
 ment to the Constitution. Senator
 Foidexter, however, was called on
 for the first argument and he mon-
 opolized practically all the time
 available, so that the Oregon Sen-
 ators found themselves allotted only
 a few minutes each, and Mrs. Clara
 B. Colby, of Portland, and other
 women present, had no time what-
 ever. Senator Lane, in the course
 of his brief argument said:

"Woman is the full partner of
 man through life. If I had my way
 I would offer the vote to the wo-
 men of the country, and would
 apologize to them for not granting
 them the franchise before."

Senator Lane said he had been
 superintendent of an insane asylum
 before becoming Mayor of Portland.
 "Perhaps it was good preparation
 for my present job," he said. In
 his fight against the liquor interests
 in Portland as Mayor, and against
 corruption, he said, women of the
 state had "backed him to the limit."

"I furnished a woman whom I
 appointed health officer with a po-
 lice badge and a billy going after
 her duties," said Senator Lane. "Of
 course she did not have to use the
 billy," he added, amid a general
 laugh.

The Senator bore testimony that
 women had aided him in his cam-
 paign for the Senate and that he
 had pledged them his support when
 he came to the Senate and that he
 intended to give it.
