PROTEST MADE BY MONTENEGRO

"Unjust and Cruel" Declares King Nicholas Against Evacuation of Scutari.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
LONDON, April 28.—The repre-
sentative of the Montenegrin gov-
ernment in London received instruc-
tions today from Cetinje ordering
him to protest against the demand
of the European powers for an im-
mediate evacuation of Scutari by
the Montenegrins, which is describ-
ed by King Nicholas as "unjust and
cruel."

VIENNA, April 28.—Crown
Prince Daniel, of Montenegro,
and his troops marched out of Scu-
tari toward the north, according to
official dispatches. Only five bat-
teries of Montenegrin artillery re-
main in that city.

ANOTHER CURE IS NOW FOUND

Chicago Physician Announces Remedy for Tuberculosis—Tests to be Made.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—
Belief that a cure for tuberculosis
has been discovered aside from that
claimed by Dr. Friedmann was an-
nounced here today. The Jesuits
have decided to establish a research
laboratory in Loyola University, Chi-
cago, in which tests looking to the
establishment of the claims of the
inventor of the cure can be made.
No report of the supposed efficacy of
the alleged cure accompanied the an-
nouncement. The serum was dis-
covered by Dr. Peter Dukel, of Chi-
cago, who claims to have cured ad-
vanced cases of consumption. The
United States health service will be
in charge of the test.
