CAPT. ROBERT CHANGED.

U. S. Engineer Well Known on Coos Bay Transferred to South. PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—Great regret was expressed by Major Jay J. Morrow, corps of engineers, United States army, at the prospect of losing Captain Henry H. Robert, who is to be transferred from this district, probably to San Antonio where he will act as an engineer officer on the staff of the commanding officer of the southern department. Captain Robert has been in local charge of the Dalles-Celilo canal work for the past three years. He will be relieved by Captain Theodore H. Dillon, now stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., in command of an engineer company.

Gas Schooner Will Make Few Trips To Help Patsy. PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—Because of the fact that the gas schooner Patsy cannot handle all of the business into the Sleslaw, Baumgartner & Baker, local agents of the Elmore Steamship company, have decided to send the gas schooner Tillamook down there for a few trips, leaving here first Tuesday night. The Tillamook arrived in the river this morning from Bandon and is discharging a cargo of white cedar ties for the S. P. & S. at Astoria. She will sail from here with a cargo of railroad material for the Sleslaw, supplemented by a carload of railroad iron for the new north jetty, being built there.
