with an attendance of thirty scholars. Henry Sengstacken has declined the nomination for coroner on the Republican ticket, and L. Munroe has been substituted.  
 Three families arrived last Sunday direct from Nebraska, consisting of twenty-one members. They are going to settle on the Coquille River.  
 The hoodlums of Empire appear to have a regularly organized gang for the purpose of robbing Indian graves and perpetrating other crimes. Several of them are in jail.  
 The settlers along the Coos Bay Wagon road are almost without any means of communication with the markets on which they must rely. The storms of the last winter rendered the road practically impassable and there appears to be but very little prospect that the company will expend any money upon it, and the settlers along the road are not permitted to work out their road tax upon it, and they are unable to open it at their own expense, and as it belongs to a corporation it cannot be changed to a county road. Now we are informed that the company would be willing to surrender the road to the state, free of charge, and the state has heretofore granted aid to other roads in various parts of the state. Coos county never has received one cent's worth of aid from the state for any internal improvements, neither out of the 500,000 acre grant nor out of the sales of our tide, swamp or overflowed lands, and if the county can show a public necessity for state aid, and then demand it in a proper manner, it would appear just as reasonable that we should receive proper consideration at the hands of the legislature, at the next session.

**IF YOU CAN'T PAY INSTALLMENTS, GET THE MONEY BACK**  
**Court Rules You Can; Judge Makes House Refund All It Got.**  
 BUFFALO, N. Y., April 30.—A man who buys merchandise on the installment plan and fails to keep up his payments can recover all the money paid if the installment house takes the goods away from him, according to a decision handed down by Justice Louis W. Marcus of the Supreme Court.  
 The plaintiff in the case paid \$99.75 on furniture valued at \$185. He defaulted in payments agreed upon under a conditional contract and the furniture house seized the goods. He sued for \$99.75.  
 Justice Marcus holds that the purchaser did not waive his rights in a sale, although he authorized the merchant to hold a public or private sale of the goods.  
 "The agreement that the defendants may retain all payments for rent or hire for the use of the goods is ineffectual," Justice Marcus rules. "The payments were made on the purchase price and not for rent, and he is entitled to recover the amount paid."
