**No. 5. The Target, by Boucher**

HOW prettily Boucher has expressed his thought in this picture! It might almost serve as a valentine for some charming lady. Certainly some one's heart has been pierced—witness the target. Was it the artist's, or was he designing this touching idea for another?

The work of Boucher is often criticized for its shallowness. This is unfair, because his work is a reflection of his time, and is of the sort that the time demanded.

The life of the French court of

A spirit of unreality pervaded the court life. The artist painting the likeness of a nobleman with large estates would depict him as a shepherd piping to a nymph. Love-making came to be considered the chief end of shepherds in the popular conception of these courtiers. No lady of fashion would think of having her portrait painted unless she appeared as Flora, or Diana, or as Venus attended by Cupid. Watteau of the previous generation of artists had led the way; now Fragonard and Boucher followed his leading.

This is just the sort of a thing the dissolute court of Louis XV. desired. And it must be admitted that these rouged and painted beauties, these powdered and bewigged shepherds and shepherdesses do not fail to make a superb effect when seen in the exquisite setting which the luxurious furnishings of that time gave them. And with all their lack of intellectual depth, it must not be thought that their execution was faulty.

It was excellent; good in color, good in composition, good in drawing.

In this picture we find a further development of the cherub idea, or rather another development, which goes back to the Greeks. For these are cupids, rather than cherubs. In Byzantine art the cherubs are found merely as heads surrounded by wings. Later in the art of Italy we find the child's body added. In the Flemish art of Rubens and his school we find the cherub idea almost obliterated by the child idea. Here Boucher has gone to the Greek god of love, Eros, and the tiny figures that he and the other painters of this period used in their pictures are little loves, quite removed from the angel idea.

**TRY NEW PLAN.**

**Siuslaw Men to Get Anchors and Cables for Distressed Boats.**

The Florence West says: "Nearly every time that a vessel has gone ashore while entering the Siuslaw River, it has been said that if suitable lines and anchors had been at hand or could have been procured immediately, that the vessel could have been floated off at once with little or no injury. It is the general opinion of men who have had experience in that line of work that a great deal of trouble and expense could have been avoided and probably more than one boat saved, if the necessary appliances could have been had in time to hold the vessel off the bank and prevent succeeding high tides from carrying it farther up on the sands. Since the Anvil went ashore some of the members of the Port Commission have been thinking over the question as to what can be done, and the matter will probably be brought up for consideration at the next regular meeting of the board on Wednesday, May 7. It has been suggested that a couple of heavy anchors and four or five thousand feet of cable be purchased and be kept at Florence or some convenient place where it can be quickly obtained in case of an accident to any vessel. If this is done the anchors and cable could be taken on board a tug and carried at once the place where it is needed. By prompt assistance much expense and perhaps the loss of a vessel could be avoided."

**THE VEGETABLE GARDEN**

Lower the Cost of Living by Growing Your Own Vegetables.

One of the certain ways of lowering the high cost of living, and that is likewise within the reach of nearly everybody, is to have a vegetable garden. Except for those who live in apartments, where a window box is tabooed, everyone can grow a little patch of vegetables. Besides saving pennies on the table, it also provides the more and nicer vegetables that are always secure in a store.

Nearly every house or flat has a small yard in which can be planted a few seeds, supplying lettuce, cabbages, onions, beets, parsnips, and turnips, and, of course, peas. There is more space, more sun, and added to the list. Peas, beans, Summer squash and even pumpkins are by no means difficult to grow, and, if one has a large enough garden, a few shrubs of arborvitae will supply any demand. The vegetables are particularly easy to grow as they require very little care. The ground has been prepared, as their wide-spreading leaves occupy a good deal of space, and one can have them.

Many a family is supplied with usual "soup vegetables" and lettuce from the contents of a whole box or two where there is no garden space. With rich soil and plenty of fresh air, care in keeping the vegetables of this kind the year around.

Few vegetables are more easily grown than radishes. A rich, well-loam soil in a sheltered place is best, and if you have the space, the seeds sown in rows six inches apart, covering them with half an inch of soil. Lettuce planted in much the same way. When the little plants of lettuce begin to come up, the bed should be thinned out and only a few plants left. Not everybody has that lettuce can grow again from the same root. If the leaves are cut off to the ground, instead of having the plant pulled up. Great care should be taken preparing the vegetable garden at the start. When one wants to have a complete vegetable garden, as rich soil as possible. For example, it then harrow or rake thoroughly pulverized. From part of it, making the rows three or four feet apart, and in rows plant peas, beans, sweet corn, etc. For cucumbers and Summer squash make small round beds slightly raised and flat, about eight feet apart each way, putting plenty of seed. To be sure that seeds will come up, soak the seeds one day or two before planting also pat all seeds firmly into soil with a small board. Don't be afraid to press the earth down and leave some boards over the seeds for a few days to prevent earth from drying too much. Cabbage and tomato plants may be chased from a market garden in rows about three feet apart.

The most successful way to grow cucumbers is to space up the ground in a large circle. Then take a reel with the bottom knocked out in the center of the circle and fill it two-thirds full of well-rotted manure. Plant cucumber seeds some good variety in hills and the barrel and every day turn upon the manure a path or two water. The water will soak through and keep the ground moist and rich. Cucumbers grow in this way will mature more quickly and yield more abundantly than grown in the usual way, and will never grow yellow or bitter. A large amount of the best pickles can be had in this and the vines will not dry up and the weather becomes hot and but will yield until frost comes.

Salsify makes the choicest of vegetable soup, tasting decidedly rich oyster soup. Fresh salsify cooking purposes may be had at time by growing it in a glass of water. It will root in less than a week and grow rapidly, much stronger and bushier than apart. Don't change the water that is necessary is to add a fresh water every day or so see that the jar is kept well up.
