### Prohibition's Onward March.

(From the Union Signal.)

Maine.—Statutory prohibition enacted in 1851, repealed in 1856, re-enacted in 1858 making at this present year 57 years of prohibition. "That prohibition has accomplished a vast work for temperance in the state no candid man will deny. The liquor traffic is no longer respectable. \* \* \* Those who engage in it are criminals in the light of the law."—Excerpt from a speech of Hon. Edwin C. Burleigh, U. S. Senator and ex-Governor of Maine.

At a recent Sunday School rally in Maine out of 8000 children present, only one had ever seen a drunken man.—From the Union Signal.

"The liquor people try to make us believe that Maine is poverty stricken, etc., but today Maine has on deposit in her savings banks \$212 per capita. Not naturally a rich state, yet she has the largest per capita savings bank deposit of any state in the Union."—Mrs. Florence Ewell Atkins.

Kansas.—Constitutional prohibition since 1880, the law is well enforced. Not an open saloon in Kansas. Public sentiment for law enforcement stronger than ever before.

Governor George H. Hodge (Democrat of Kansas, when interviewed by a temperance advocate said: "During my campaign I made clear and positive my attitude of the enforcement of the prohibitory law; I wish to reiterate and emphasize those statements. We shall hold County Attorneys, Sheriffs and Mayors strictly accountable for the strict enforcement of the prohibitory law."

North Dakota.—Had prohibition since statehood in 1889. The law has been, and is, well enforced, and the sentiment stronger now than ever before, as prohibition has proved itself to be synonymous with prosperity.

Georgia.—Statutory prohibition since January 1, 1908.

Prohibition is a great blessing to Georgia. It has been a Godsend to the negro and the working-man especially. Under prohibition business has increased; the bank reports show a healthy financial condition of affairs. Atlanta's bank clearings for the first week of January, 1912, showed the largest per cent gain in the United States. Savings bank deposits made a tremendous gain in 1912 over any previous year. In the last five years under state prohibition Georgia has been forging ahead at an incredible rate.

The financial showing by trust companies and banks, the splendid dividends declared, the optimistic outlook, make us feel as if Midas were passing by and turning all to glittering gold. He is! His modern name is Prohibition!

Mississippi.—Statutory prohibition since January 1, 1909.

Oklahoma.—Constitutional prohibition adopted September 11, 1907; later, November 8, 1909, a local option and high license amendment was defeated by a majority of 21,077. Sentiment stronger than ever for enforcement of the law.

### HOLD PEACE CONGRESS.

Fourth Annual Session of American Body in St. Louis.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)  
ST. LOUIS, May 1.—The fourth American Peace Congress began a three-days' session today with delegates attending from all parts of the country. The chief address this morning was delivered by Andrew Carnegie, Benjamin F. Trueblood, secretary of the American Peace Society, spoke on "the present demands of the peace movement."

"We must urge," he said, "that all controversies not susceptible of adjustment by direct negotiations be submitted to the court of arbitration of The Hague or to other tribunals which it may be found advisable to create."

## COOS COUNTY FAIR EXHIBIT

### MAYOR STRAW SAYS IT CAN GROW ALMOST ANYTHING—TO CLEAR BOULEVARD.

At a meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last evening, Mayor Straw expounded a vision that he had regarding the Coos and Curry exhibit at the Panama Exposition. He said that he wanted to see the two counties erect a building at the exposition, every bit of the materials in which would be products of the two counties. Then he said they could conduct a restaurant in connection with the exhibit that would serve anyone anything they wished and that all the products would be raised on Coos County soil. The wood and coal for fuel would come from its forests and mines, the wheat, buckwheat and corn table dishes would be products of its fields, the bread and cakes would be made from its grains, fruit and vegetables of all kinds could be raised here and even tea could be grown here to serve. With the exception of coffee, he said there wasn't anything produced anywhere in the United States but could be produced in Coos County. He said that even venison and other game, including fish, could be served from Coos County as a special permit could be secured for it. His idea was referred to the committee in charge of the exposition.

### Clear Boulevard.

Mayor Straw reported that \$220 had already been raised towards the fund to clear part of the right of way for the Marshfield-to-the-sea boulevard. The Southern Oregon Company, which has held back on giving the right of way has consented to a trail being slashed across its holdings providing no large trees are taken out. The Simpson Company is in favor of granting the right of way. He said that two or three times as much more could be secured in subscriptions. He said that there was question as to whether Anderson avenue or Elrod avenue would make the best terminal for the boulevard in Marshfield. Finally Hugh McLain, A. T. Haines and Eugene O'Connell were appointed a committee to award the contract and see that part of the boulevard is cleared at once.

### Other Business.

C. I. Reigard asked that a committee be appointed to arrange for the construction of a bridge across Isthmus Inlet south of the C. A. Smith mill. He said that there were no branches on wagon roads within a reasonable drive of Marshfield and that such a bridge would enable ranchers on Isthmus and Catching Inlet and the intervening section to drive to town with their products. He said that at least 25 farmers wanted it.

President D. C. Green said there was a Seattle man on the Bay who wanted to start an overall factory to make overalls and working men's clothes. He said that the man wanted someone to furnish some money to start the factory.

President Green reported that the committee was endeavoring to straighten out the affairs of the Coos Bay Business College and if A. E. Stossmeister would not return and carry it on, other parties might be induced to take it over or assist Mr. Sisk in making it a success.

C. I. Reigard reported that Dr. Bartle, J. W. Bennett and himself had taken up the question of getting the right to use the Government military reserve at Coos Head for a city park. Senator Chamberlain had taken it up with the War Department and referred it to Major Morrow, who was to report on it. Hugh McLain, who is going to Portland next week, was delegated to confer with Major Morrow about it.
