### LAND-CLEARING MACHINE.

## North Bend Men Have Scheme for Taking Out Stumps.

The Coquille Herald says: "W. T. Hendryx and Leslie Irwin were on the river last week from North Bend. Mr. Irwin had his eye out for a good location for a machine shop, while Mr. Hendryx wanted to see if there were any stumps over here that stood in need of destruction. He is the inventor and principal owner of a machine for clearing land, which he claims, with apparent good reason, is the best thing yet. The photographs he shows represent a donkey engine, a blowing machine like a fanmill and a system of galvanized iron pipes, given flexibility by sections of rubber hose, the whole thing looking like the last word in devil-fishes. By setting fire to a stump and directing a strong draught of air upon the fire an intense heat is generated and the most hardened old sinner of a stump is reduced to ashes in a few hours — not only above ground but as far into the ground as it is desired to follow the roots. It looks as though this machine would furnish a cheap and effective way of clearing logged-off lands, of which there are thousands of acres in Coos County capable of bearing agricultural products."

## U. S. Topographic Maps For the Public Schools

FOR teaching the geography of the United States in the public schools and colleges a strong effort is being made by the United States Geological Survey to foster the use of government topographic maps. These maps contain so many details of local interest, showing even the school houses and farm houses as well as every wagon road, with which of course the school children are familiar, that it is said to be an easy matter for teachers to enlist the interest of the pupils in this new type of school map. From an understanding of the particular maps representing their own localities it is but a succession of short steps to lead the pupils to an appreciation of the different types of country portrayed on maps of other sections of the United States. Most of the standard atlas sheets of the geological survey of recent issue are printed on the scale of one mile to one inch, a scale which shows the physical features of the country in very interesting detail.

### Show Altitudes at All Points.

With these maps the pupils can determine the altitude of their homes and the steepness of hills and mountains, estimate the grade of wagon roads, work out simple engineering problems such as the drainage of swamps, select dam sites for the construction of reservoirs to supply water to imaginary towns, or for irrigation, lay out imaginary trolley or railroad lines or canals along the most feasible routes, establish look-out and signal stations on high points for the control of forest fires, and plan many other similar activities.

The geological survey has published 2,200 topographic maps sheets, covering about 40 per cent of the United States, and on receipt of 10 different maps selected with special reference to the particular requirements of the class it is proposed to instruct in this new kind of geographic study. This selection will include, besides the map covering the area where the school is situated (provided such a map is published), other maps showing all the physiographic forms to be found in the United States — seacoast areas, hilly country, high and precipitous mountain country, broad and level regions of innumerable lakes, areas showing dense forests, areas with woodlands interspersed with many streams, lakes and other natural features.

### Maps Sold at Nominal Prices.

If less than fifty maps are desired, a special selection of a less number will be made on request and furnished at the retail rate of 10 cents a copy. Most of these maps, covers about 225 square miles, or 150,000 acres, have been made at a cost of \$3500 to \$6000 each and the wholesale price of six cents per map covers only about the cost of paper and printing. If the areas were surveyed and the maps published by a commercial concern, these maps would need to be sold for not less than \$2 to \$3 each. The survey also sells an excellent wall map 4 by 6 feet, unmounted (in three sections), for 60 cents. This may be included in any wholesale order as part of the \$2. Applications and remittances should be made to the Director of the United States Geological Survey, Washington, D. C., who will promptly fill all orders.

## TRAITOR MASON IS A SUICIDE

### Tucson Engineer Kills Self Because He Told Lodge Secrets.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., May 8.—Ernest L. Johnson, a mining engineer of Tucson, committed suicide in a hotel here by taking poison.

He left a note addressed to Robert Mitchell, of Tucson, saying he intended to kill himself because he had revealed secrets of the Masonic order.

### SEVERED NOSE RESTORED.

## German Student's Prompt Action Saves Feature Sliced in Duel.

BERLIN, May 8.—How a severed nose tip was speedily restored to its place is related by the Munich Medical Monthly.

A student, it is stated, had his nose slashed off in a duel. The wounded man coolly picked up the piece of flesh and, placing it in his mouth, hurried to the hospital.

There he was complimented by the surgeons, who declared that the patient's procedure was scientifically correct, for the warmth of the mouth had prevented the cellular death of the severed organ. The nose tip was duly washed, and there and then sewn on the student's face, and he departed smiling.

### SOFT DRINK IS FOUND TO CONTAIN HARD KICK

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., May 8.—Yakima Foam, a so-called soft drink, may no longer be sold in North Yakima outside of regularly licensed saloons. Though the drink does not contain enough alcohol to come within the definition of beer by the state law, the testimony of Sheriff Metzger and others goes to show that a man can get drunk on it, and the city officials have taken the precaution to remove it from sale in poolrooms and soft drink parlors, where there has been a large demand for it.

### WILL SURPRISE EUGENE.

## People There Expecting North Bend Athletes to Walk to Town.

Eugene was probably given a surprise this week when Joe Barber, Fremont Hodson and John Hansen arrived there for the state field meet. They were expecting them to walk in. Instead, North Bend businessmen raised funds to defray their expenses. The Eugene Guard says: "In the town of North Bend, Coos County, there are two high school lads who are so anxious to participate in the interscholastic track meet to be held at the University next Saturday that they will walk to Eugene, a distance of over 100 miles, in order to cut down expenses. "Joseph Barber, a weight man credited with heaving the 12-pound shot 44 feet, and John Hansen, who runs the low hurdles are the prep athletes who would help the varsity student body by lowering their necessary expenses from \$25 to \$15 per man. "The third member of the North Bend team, Fremont Hodson, is an all-round man of such quality that the coach has deemed it advisable to ship him by stage and rail. He broad jumps close to 21 feet, runs the hundred in 10-1.5 seconds and incidentally is entered in the 50 and 220-yard dashes."

## GOVERNMENT GAINS POINT

### Expectation Is Case Will Go Against Southern Oregon Company.

PORTLAND, Or., May 9.—The demurrer of the Southern Oregon Company against the Government's suit for the forfeiture of a land grant of 96,000 acres in Coos and Douglas Counties was overruled in United States District Court by James Wolverton. The case is similar to that of the Oregon & California Railroad Company, decided in favor of the Government last week. The case will now be tried and as the questions at issue are almost identical with those of the larger case, it is expected that it will be decided in the same manner. The grant was made on condition that a military road should be constructed from Roseburg to Coos Bay.

## Swat the Fly and Protect Your Baby

A recent bulletin issued by the Portland Board of Health stated that a baby less than a year old had only as much chance to see its first birthday as a person 80 years old had to see his or her next birthday, says the Eugene Guard.

One reason for the awful infant mortality was ascribed by the bulletin to the lack of care in seeing that the milk used to feed the baby was absolutely clean. The bulletin stated further that if a fly should fall into the milk it was better to throw the milk away, because the fly has as a rule millions of germs on its feet, its wings and body, which are left in the milk, even if the fly escapes.

The common housefly feeds in filthy garbage pails, in manure heaps, in decomposed refuse and offal, which are breeding places for billions of disease and filth germs.

From such a feeding place the fly goes directly to your house, and alights on the food you are preparing for your children, contaminates it and impregnates it with filth and disease.

That is the way the filthy house fly spreads diphtheria, scarlet fever and kindred malignant children's diseases.

If every woman would see that her home is properly screened so that houseflies could not enter; if every householder was careful that no filth heap was left close to the house as a breeding place for flies, disease and less epidemics, less disease and less mortality among children.

Now, with the advent of warm weather comes the time when of the multiples by millions. Now is the time to begin the campaign of extermination. Every fly you kill prevents the birth and life of a million more. Swat the fly and have your babies live.

### TO THE HOLY LAND FOR END OF WORLD.

Fremont Man Says Balkan War Presages Calamity.

FREMONT, May 9.—Belleville, that the Balkan war presages the end of the world, P. H. Wintersteen, aged 70, has left for Jerusalem, Palestine.

Thirty years ago Mr. Wintersteen made a similar trip to Palestine, believing that the end of the world was then near. He returned, saying he was in error as to the time.

Mr. Wintersteen, who is prominent here and the head of a large firm, now says the "final scenes of the struggle between the anti-Christ element and God's people will take place soon in Palestine."
