NEW ROAD TO EMPIRE PLAN

County Commissioners Indorse North Bend Man's Project For Newmark Street.

N. C. McLeod, Dr. Bartle, E. J. Simpson and H. G. Kern, who were in conference with the Coos County Commissioners at Coquille yesterday about getting a new highway opened from North Bend to Empire returned last evening and report that the County Commissioners were only too glad to co-operate with them. The plan is to run the road south on Broadway, North Bend, to Newmark street and thence westerly to Empire. The committee had Engineer Richardson run the lines on the new highway and is now having plans prepared by him for it. As soon as his plans are completed, the County Court will order about \$5000 of the \$7000 road funds of the North Bend district expended on this road and will have it graded this fall. Next year, it is planned to have a special levy voted in the road district to hard surface the road.

Allegany Road Project.

A. G. Raab, who had the Allegany road project in charge for the North Bend Commercial Club, reports that he is unable to get the co-operation of the Glasgow Townsite Company on the project. He says all the ranchers along the route are in favor of it, but the Glasgow Townsite Company, which owns a big tract which would be especially benefited, has refused to answer his appeals for aid in the project. In consequence, it will have to be temporarily dropped.

TAKE LASHELLE NORTH TODAY

U. S. Deputy Marshal Here for Alleged White Slaver—Goes to Spokane for Trial.

Deputy U. S. Marshal W. B. Griffith arrived here this afternoon from Portland to take W. F. LaShelle, who was arrested by Marshal Anderson in North Bend the other day, to Portland, thence to Spokane, Wash., to answer to the charge of "white slavery." Mr. Griffith talked with LaShelle for awhile. The latter protested his innocence and displayed a marriage certificate to prove that the woman with him in North Bend is his wife. However, LaShelle admitted knowing the persons mentioned in the complaint against him. He agreed to waive the hearing before U. S. Commissioner Arthur Peck this afternoon.

In the complaint, it is charged that LaShelle and Harry Jenkins in September, 1912, brought one Nellie Murphy from Nez Perce county, Idaho, to the state of Washington for immoral purposes. Mr. Griffith expects to leave tonight via Drain with his prisoner.

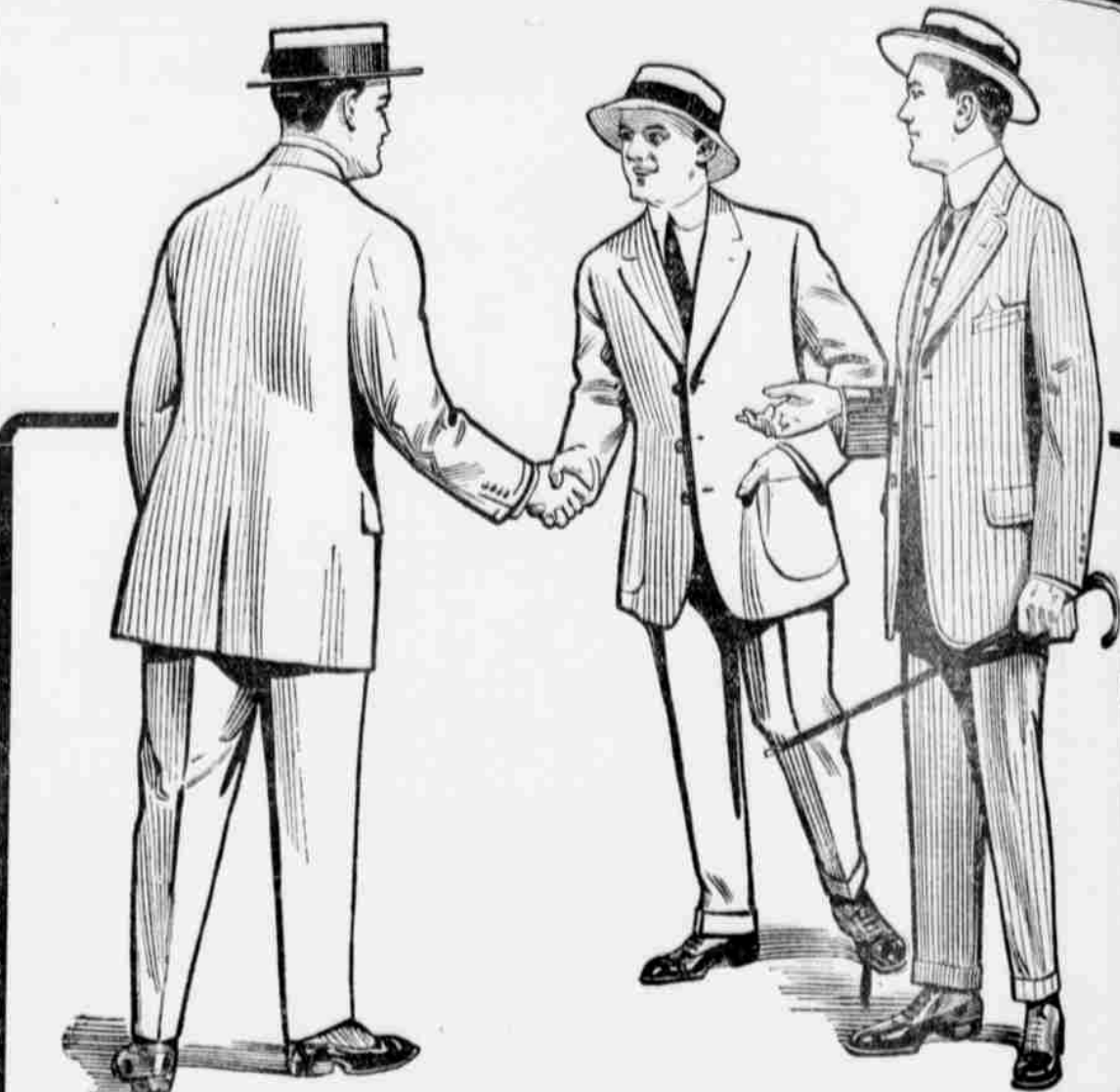

FOUR POLICE GO TO PRISON

Former Inspectors of New York Department Sentenced for Recent Graft Revelations

 NEW YORK, May 9.—Dennis Sweeney, John Murtha, James E. H. Sweeney, John Murtha, James E. Hussey and James F. Thompson, former police inspectors, convicted of conspiring to obstruct justice and to check graft revelations involving them, were sentenced today to serve one year in the penitentiary and pay a fine of \$500 each. This is the maximum sentence.

GREAT POTATO YIELD.

Eugene Demond of Lane County Raised 660 Pounds From One Spud.

SALEM, Ore., May 9.—Oregon leads the world in the potato race, and England comes next, according to the announcement made today by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman. Eugene Demond, a Lane County boy, raised 660 pounds of potatoes from one potato, while England's boy, who comes next, raised 220 pounds from 11 potatoes, according to the superintendent. The Oregon boy accomplished the remarkable feat by replanting sprouts of the original potato, which had thirteen eyes, and by this unique process planted 308 hills in all. He won the prize at the State Industrial Fair.

MEDICAL EXAMINATION IS REQUIRED

Applicants for Marriage License Must Have Physician's Certificate of Health.

SALEM, Or., May 9.—Among new laws which will become effective about June 5, is one requiring a medical certificate to be filed with the County Clerk by every male person who applies for a marriage license. This certificate must be signed and sworn to by a physician duly authorized to practice medicine within the state of Oregon. The physician must certify that he has examined the applicant and "that from said examination I have found said applicant to be free from contagious or infectious orereal disease."
