WILL RENEW TREATY

Secretary Bryan Anticipates No Difficulty With Great Britain. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, May 10.—Secretary of State Bryan said today while the British government had not directly asked to renew the arbitration treaty which expires by limitation in June, he expected it would be effectually renewed in time to preserve it. Last January former Secretary Knox invited Great Britain to exchange ratifications of the Taft peace treaties which were subsequently amended in the Senate and this offer yet remains open. An exchange of ratifications of that treaty would virtually be a renewal of the existing one.

NO CHANGE IN STRIKE.

California Electric Workers Lock-Out Continues. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—At the headquarters of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and also at union headquarters it was stated today that there was little change in the general situation of the strike throughout the state. Although the California Light and Power Council (the union) has no official standing with the San Francisco Labor Council, members of the unions are affiliated with the latter organization and will not apply for jobs vacated by men who joined the strike. This substantiates the decision of the three hours' conference of the Labor Council.
