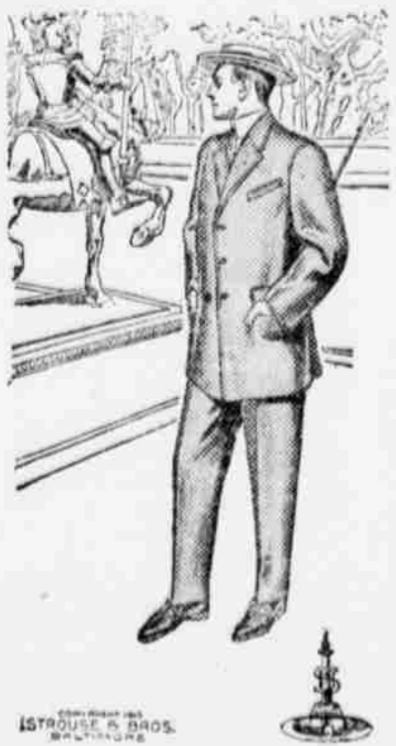

TO ENLARGE HIGH SCHOOL

Three or Four Rooms to Be Added for Next Year—Pay of Teachers Increased.

At a meeting of the Marshfield school board last evening, it was decided to complete the top story of the High school building, adding three rooms and possibly four to accommodate the increased attendance next year. A laboratory will be put in.

Miss Ethel A. Rees of Pennsylvania, who will secure her B. A. and M. A. degrees at the University of Michigan this year and who has high school and grade teaching experience, was elected to fill the vacancy in the high school corps caused by the resignation of Miss Carpenter.

The board also raised the pay of several teachers. Miss Hilda Stenholm, principal of the Central building, was advanced to \$99 per month. Miss Elmore was advanced to \$80. Mrs. P. M. Wilbur was advanced to \$80 and Miss Elizabeth Moore was advanced to \$100.

The reported trouble at the Central building over the payment for a phonograph was brought up and was dismissed by the board. Miss Stenholm's statement of the affair was substantiated, those protesting about it evidently having erroneously construed her statement to the pupils.

MANY ARRIVE ON REDONDO

Steamer Gets in Friday From San Francisco With Unusually Large Cargo.

The Redondo arrived in late yesterday from San Francisco with a capacity passenger list and the largest freight cargo she has brought in for a long time. She had considerable freight for North Bend, some for the Standard Oil Company, some for Kruse & Banks, some chemicals for the new pulp mill plant, about 100,000 bricks for the new Chandler building and big shipments of fruit and vegetables and California, in addition to miscellaneous freight.

The Redondo had a good trip up, the sea being very calm and smooth until they passed the mouth of the Rogue River and there they encountered a southeast wind.

The Redondo will sail at 4 o'clock Tuesday.
