Discoverers of America



"The Story of America in Pictures; The Discoverers" will be told in The Times in "The Mentor" next week. This is the first part of a series which will give the history of America thoroughly and entertainingly to readers of The Times. The library has the opportunity of buying the following books for seventy-five cents each, but it lacks the three dollars with which to purchase them. It already has copies of these fairy tales, but so great is the demand for them that sometimes a child waits weeks to get a glimpse of the story he wants. The books themselves are worn to pieces with use; Hans Andersen's fairy tales, illustrated by Helen Stratton, Hauff's Fairy Tales, Translated by Sybil Theogier. With illustrations by Dorothy Morris.

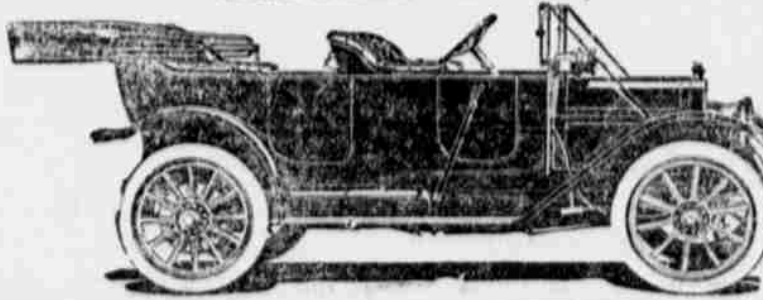
