NEW ROUTE TO BAY.
Florence Wants Coos Bay Travel That Way.
The Florence West says: "We learn that plans are now on foot that will result in giving Florence and the Siuslaw the benefit of a large part of the travel to Coos Bay. At present nearly all the people making the trip to Coos Bay by land, leave the railroad at Drain or Roseburg and take the stage for their destination. It is expected that the railroad from Eugene will be finished by next fall. The plan is to improve the beach stages and direct the overland travel to Florence and thence by boat to Mapleton. This will cut out the stage ride across the Coast Mountains which is a hard trip, especially in the winter, and give the travelers an easy drive along the ocean beach. This trip on the beach from the Siuslaw to the Umpqua takes only three or four hours and the road is smooth and good when the tide is out. By using automobiles the time on the beach can be cut down till it will be only a pleasant ride, not long enough to make a person feel fatigued."

Council Meeting.—The Marshfield City Council will meet this evening to take up various city matters, including street improvement matters.

Meet Tomorrow.—The Ladies' Guild of the Episcopal church will meet tomorrow afternoon at the rectory. All ladies of the church are cordially invited.

Ship Cheese.—The Rainbow brought 5,600 pounds of cheese to Marshfield this morning from the Coos Bay Creamery to be shipped on the Breakwater and consigned to T. B. Klock of Seattle.

Goes Abroad.—Word has been received here from Manly Roberts, that Miss Florence Roberts sailed from San Francisco last week for Honolulu and Japan, where she will spend about six months on a pleasure trip.

Builds at Eugene.—The Eugene Guard announces that C. P. Barnard, of Roseburg, mail contractor for the Roseburg-Coos Bay and Roseburg-Coquille valley routes, will build a two-story brick block at Ninth and Oak streets, Eugene, this summer.

Move Anvil.—Parties from Florence stated that the Anvil is being pulled considerably nearer the water and that it is expected to float her on the high tides this week. Whether she has been much damaged cannot be ascertained but it is feared that her hull has suffered considerably.

To State Assembly.—Mrs. Kate Lando and Mrs. Nellie Owen left today to attend the Oregon Rebekah State Assembly at Medford, being the delegates from Western State Rebekah Lodge of Marshfield. Mrs. Lando is also warden of the State Assembly, which convenes May 29.

Funeral Today.—The funeral of H. R. Hyde was held this morning from the home in South Marshfield, Rev. J. E. Burkhardt officiating. It was private, only relatives and intimate friends attending. The pallbearers were Supt. Tiedgen, I. S. Smith, F. E. Norton, F. L. Grannis, F. E. Allen and F. C. Birch.

Return Home.—R. M. Buttle and E. T. Johnson, who were injured in the Gardner stage accident a month ago, are in Marshfield, Mr. Buttle coming from Gardiner on the tug last evening. While much improved, both men are on crutches and will leave on the Breakwater this afternoon for their respective homes.

Gets Ducking.—Tom Hal, who is one of the most ardent fishermen in Marshfield, Saturday had hard luck in getting ready for an expedition against the trout. He was trying to get out his boat and fell overboard on the mudflat, having to wade in soft mud up to his waist. However, he went fishing.

Test Gang Moves.—It is stated that the men who have been making the tests for the foundation for the piers of the S. P. across the Umpqua will go to Florence within a few days to make the tests on the Siuslaw. Engineer Broughton, it is understood, will have supervision of the construction of the three bridges.

Mail Changes.—On June 1, the summer mail schedule between Roseburg and Coos Bay will be resumed. The incoming mail will arrive late in the evening from Roseburg, instead of in the morning as at present, and the outgoing mail will leave about 5 o'clock in the morning instead of at 6:30 in the evening as at present.

Relatives Here.—Eugene DuMond, of Albany, who has attained fame as a potato raiser, is a nephew of Mrs. F. E. Allen, of South Marshfield. He is but 13 years old and last year in the school contest produced 660 pounds of spuds from one potato. This is said to be a world-wide record, the nearest to it being a boy in England, who raised 220 pounds from 11 potatoes.

Gets Twenty Days.—F. W. Dickman, the Coaledo logger who was given a severe trouncing by A. H. Powers the other night on the incoming train, today entered a plea of guilty before Justice Penneck to a charge of using vile and profane language in a public place. He was given 20 days in the county jail. Constable Cox taking him to Coquille this afternoon. The in-

formation against Dickman was signed by Superintendent W. F. Miller. Dickman is said to have formerly been a Northern Pacific freight conductor.

Kinney Case.—Judge Coke went to Coquille this morning to convene Circuit Court. The case of J. C. Doane vs. L. D. Kinney to recover \$1600 was slated for trial before a jury this morning.

Auto Accident.—Will Hendrix, of North Bend, started for Coquille this afternoon in his car. When about four miles out, he ran off the grade, the car turning over and pinning him underneath. Some of r. P. Norton's road gang came to the rescue. He was pretty badly bruised and the car slightly damaged.

Take Prisoners.—Sheriff Gage and Deputy Sheriff Glen Fox arrived here at noon with Guy Greenleaf, A. Winkler and Wm. Edmunds, whom they will take to Salem tomorrow via Drain to serve terms in the penitentiary, the latter being for forgery and the two former for statutory crimes. Greenleaf's case is well known here. Winkler is a half breed Indian from Bandon.

ROBBER IS KILLED.

Roy Parks, of Aberdeen, Falls Under Train at Sutherland.
ROSEBURG, Or., May 12.—Roy Parks, apparently about 25 years of age, was almost instantly killed at a point about 100 yards north of the Sutherland depot when in company with three companions he attempted to board a northbound passenger train with a view of leaving the country and thereby escaping arrest on a charge of burglarizing the general merchandise establishment conducted by McReynolds Brothers, and situated in the town of Sutherland.
Other than finding 22 gold band rings on the dead man, the coroner found a 5-cent piece in one of his pockets, together with a note book in which was written the following:
"My name is Roy Parks. In case of accident notify James W. Parks, Aberdeen, Wash. My postoffice address is Arieta, a suburb of Portland."
