Pioneer Resident of Gravel Ford

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: Mrs, Angeline Bright died May 6, 1913, at the home of her son, Albert Bright, near Gravel Ford. She was born in Tennessee and was aged 81 years, 6 months and 17 days. She was married twice, her first husband being a Mr. Tucker, and one son was born to them. Her second husband was James S. Bright, and five children were the issue of this union. three girls and two boys. With her last husband and family she came to Coos County in September, 1872, and located on a homestead on the North Fork, where she has resided nearly 41 years. Her husband and sons worked 150 days during one year making roads to their place, receiv-ing not one cent of compensation. while the faithful wife and mother did the farm work and cared for the little ones. She was a member of U. B. church at Gravel Ford."
