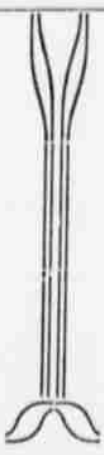

NEW CITY OFFICERS.

Myrtle Point Inducts Recently Elected Officials Into Office. The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "The new mayor and other city officials were inducted into office at the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening. They are L. A. Roberts, mayor; E. A. Dodge, recorder; J. M. Arrington (re-elected treasurer); J. D. Barklow and James S. Whitaker, councilmen. Marshal Brown's report for the month of April showed three arrests, five licenses issued and six water taps made. "The recorder read a communication, dated April 23d, from E. L. Robinson, consulting engineer commending the materials to be used in the concrete base of the pavement at the intersection of Spruce and First streets, as it was below the standard required by the specifications. "An ordinance was passed directing the mayor and recorder to sign a contract with the Coos Bay Paving and Construction Company for the paving of the intersection of Fifth and Maple streets, at \$1.30 per square yard."

MRS. BRIGHT DEAD.

Pioneer Resident of Gravel Ford Passes Away. The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "Mrs. Angeline Bright died May 6, 1913, at the home of her son, Albert Bright, near Gravel Ford. She was born in Tennessee and was aged 81 years, 6 months and 17 days. She was married twice, her first husband being a Mr. Tucker, and one son was born to them. Her second husband was James S. Bright, and five children, three girls and two boys. With her last husband and family she came to Coos County in September, 1872, and located on a homestead on the North Fork, where she has resided nearly 41 years. Her husband and sons worked 150 days during one year, making roads to their place, receiving not one cent of compensation, while the faithful wife and mother did the farm work and cared for the little ones. She was a member of U. B. church at Gravel Ford."
