ANOTHER CARLOAD OF THE FAMOUS FORD CARS ARRIVED YESTERDAY GEORGE GOODRUM RECEIVES NOTICE THAT ENTIRE OUTPUT HAS BEEN SOLD.

The auto parade is becoming a regular feature on Coos Bay because of the popularity of the Ford cars.

George Goodrum received another car load of these well known automobiles on the Breakwater yesterday. He considers himself fortunate as the company has just issued a letter, in which they say that no further orders can be filled.

Mr. Goodrum has another car load in transit and which should arrive soon. One half of the carload coming has been sold and anyone thinking of getting a Ford should order at once to avoid disappointment.

In their letter to dealers the Ford Company say:

"We have accepted all of the orders we can fill between now and August 1st, 1913, for all models except Town cars. Under no circumstances will we accept any more orders for Touring cars or Runabouts, as present acknowledged orders will in the aggregate take our entire output up to August 1st, 1913.

"This will mean that some of the orders now on file will probably not be filled until the latter part of July. The demand for Ford Model T's has been unprecedented and the closing of our order books thus early was predicted several months ago.
