# UNCLE SAM FOR COQUILLE.

**Vessel Refused Papers by Inspectors to be Towed Down Coast.**  
A Portland paper says: "Preparatory to being towed from Portland to the Coquille River, the wheel of the steamer Uncle Sam, a marine product from Corvallis to which United States Inspectors Edwards and Fuller declined to issue documents last week, has been taken out, and she is to leave shortly on an ocean voyage.

"What the future of the Uncle Sam will be has not been outlined, but the inspectors insist that her chances of passing inspection will be no more favorable on the Coquille than at Portland. Those interested in her have contemplated tying her up on the Coast harbor and probably offer her boiler and machinery for sale. She has been lying at the foot of Salmon street since arriving from Corvallis, but owing to complaint from dock owners, who said they desired to use the space for vessels, she was ordered to seek other moorings by Harbormaster Speier.

# ASK FRANCHISE AT EASTSIDE

# E. C. Drews Wants Water and Electric Rights There—Improvements Planned

E. C. Drews, manager of the Coos Bay Home Telephone Company, has notified Recorder Leaton of Eastside, that he will appear at the Council meeting there tomorrow night with an application for a water and electric franchise. Mr. Drews is said to be operating in his own behalf, having made arrangements for a company to finance the projects. The Oregon Power Company sometime ago made application for an electric franchise but the Council would not grant them as liberal a franchise as Manager Green desired.

Some of the Council have been figuring on the city of Eastside putting in its own lighting system, buying the electricity from the C. A. Smith mill the same as the Oregon Power Company does. Others are not in favor of this.

It is expected that the resignation of R. J. Montgomery as a member of the Eastside Council will be submitted tomorrow night as Mr. Montgomery will soon move to Fairview, where he has purchased a fine 120-acre ranch. Several have been talked of for his place, but it is believed that Fred Brooks may be chosen. Mr. Brooks is mail carrier in Marshfield and some thought that his Federal position might interfere with his appointment, but it may not.

The Eastside Council will also take up another street improvement project and may also take up the McKay street improvement and the plan to change the ferry landing.

# WAITE SELLS FRANCHISE.

**New York Firm Secures Right to Construct Electric Railway.**  
MEDFORD, Or., May 19.—The Interurban franchise, originally secured by the Minney Company, of Oakland, in January transferred to Colonel F. B. Waite, of Roseburg, in March transferred by the Medford City Council, was for the third time transferred to S. S. Bullis & Sons, of New York, who declare they will begin construction of the electric line within ten days.

The first unit will be extended from the center of Medford east over Bear Creek to Skillyou Heights. The line will then be built south to Phoenix, Talent and Ashland north to Central Point until a comprehensive electric system will be constructed in the Rogue River Valley. S. S. Bullis owns the Sterling mine and recently made Medford his home. He is a veteran railroad builder, having made a business of constructing small steam and electric roads throughout the United States.
