Bids Too High.—Owing to the bids being higher than expected and because sufficient money was not on hand to go ahead, the committee of the Chamber of Commerce in charge of clearing the right of way for the Marshfield-to-the-sea boulevard last evening postponed awarding the contract. Moon & Barclay bid \$31298.25 and Tribbey and Helbig bid \$1025.53, while Engineer Gettins had estimated the cost at about \$500. The matter will be taken up again soon.
