They are I. W. W. members, many of whom had been let out of the logging camps and gone there and secured jobs. The walkout, it is said, will not long inconvenience the contractors.

## DREDGE FILL ASKED BY S. P.

### Port Commission Holds Special Meeting to Consider Plan—Charlston Engineer

A special meeting of the Port of Coos Bay Commission was held last evening to arrange for bulkheading to retain the dredgings in widening and deepening the channel and also to consider a proposition from Bradford Wheeler, in charge of the Southern Pacific work in North Bend, for making a big fill for the railroad company there as the first work of the dredge.

The Southern Pacific will need about 400,000 yards of filling inside the bulkhead, or rather dike, which they will throw up in North Bend from the cut through Simpson Park. On the first cut of the dredge, that is, in making a 150-foot channel 25 feet deep, they would get about 100,000 yards. In order to get the balance of 30,000 yards, Mr. Wheeler offered to stand half the expense of the dredging in addition to the cost of handling the shore pipe, bulkheading, etc., which they will be required to pay on the first fill.

The Port Commission has agreed in a general way not to charge for dredging for fills except to require the benefitted property owners to put in the bulkheads and handle the shore pipe. The Port will thus pay for the actual dredging only in these cases.

After discussing the matter, the Port Commission decided to have Engineer Wheeler and Donald M. Charlston figure up the amount of dredging from the Smith mill end of the project to North Bend. The dredge will take out about 150,000 yards per month and it may be that it would be able to start here and reach North Bend by the time the Southern Pacific would have to have the fill. The reason for this is that if the hole is dredged at North Bend first, it may fill up considerably while the dredge is working on the Marshfield end of the channel.

**Secure Charlston.**  
The Port Commission expects to secure Donald M. Charlston, who has been the U. S. field engineer on the Port of Coos Bay and Coquille River improvements for the last few years to act as their engineer. Mr. Charlston has consented, providing he can get leave of absence from the Government. Application to Major Morrow has been made and it is expected that he will arrange it.

Mr. Charlston's familiarity with the Bay, and his ability and integrity which have won for him a high place in the esteem of those he has been brought in contact with will be most valuable to the Commission.
