EXAMINATION WAS HARD

Only 38 Per Cent of Douglas County Pupils Passed State Test. In view of the fact that 24 out of the 29 Marshfield pupils who took the Oregon state eighth grade examination passed in all branches and the other five failed in two or less studies each, so that they can take the test again in June, when they will undoubtedly pass, the following dispatch from Roseburg will be of interest: "Pupils taking the eighth grade examination in Douglas County this month were not very successful, as out of 297 that took the examinations only 110, or 38 per cent, passed. There were 88 conditioned to take another examination, write the remaining 99 failed in more than two studies. The examination was a strong one, especially in the subject of arithmetic."

CHANGE CHURCH NAME

Oregon Episcopalians Would Drop Protestant From Title.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.—With the adoption of a resolution presented at the opening session of its twenty-second annual convention, the Western Oregon diocese of the Episcopal Church went on record in favor of a change in the church name, eliminating the word "Protestant" from the title "Protestant Episcopal," given to it in Colonial days by the American branch of the church, and will thus memorialize the general convention. The resolutions, both sections of which were adopted, are as follows: "Resolved, That the diocese of Oregon hereby memorialize the General Convention, praying that the title page of the prayer book may be amended so that it shall read as follows: 'The Book of Common Prayer and Administration of Sacrament and Other Rites and Ceremonies of the Holy Catholic Church According to the Use of the Branch Thereof Known as the Episcopal Church of the United States of America, Together with the Psalter of Psalms of David.'"

HAS FLYING BOAT.

SANDUSKY, Ohio, May 23.—Harry N. Atwood, of Boston, who has been working on a "flying boat" in which he expects to make a mile a minute speed, announced today he would try out the new invention off Marble Head, Lake Erie, next week. The boat will navigate both air and water. Atwood says he will cut the time of the Twentieth Century Limited and other fast trains between New York and Chicago by two or three hours.
