CHANGE CHURCH NAME

Oregon Episcopalians Would Drop Protestant From Title.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 23.the adoption of a resolution presented at the opening session of its twentythe annual convention, the Western Oregon diocese of the Church went on record in favor of a change in the church name, elimina-ting the word "Protestant" from the title "Protestant Episcopal," given to it in Colonial days by the American branch of the church, and will thus memoralize the general convention. The resolutions, both sections of

which were adopted, are as follows: "Resolved, That the diocese of Oregon hereby, memorialize the Gen-eral Convention, praying that the title page of the prayer book may be amended so that it shall read as follows. 'The Book of Common follows: Prayer and Administrtion of Sacrament and Other Rites and Ceremonies of the Holy Catholic Church Accord-ing to the Use of the Branch Thereof Known as the Episcopal Church of the United States of America, Together with the Psalter of Psalms of David:

'And further, that a joint commission of five bishops, five presbyters and five laymen be appointed to recommend to the General Convention such legislation as is necessary to bring the official standards of the church into harmony with the above title page.

And further, that said commission be instructed to report a form for the permanent embodiment of the organic law of the church through the ancient Church of England from the historic church founded by Christ himself: its loyalty to the principles established by and through the reformation of the Church of England, as enshrined in the book of Common Prayer and its Catholic and comprehensive character."
