ROYAL COUPLE WEDDED TODAY

Only Daughter of Emperor William, and Prince Ernest August of Cumberland

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

BERLIN, May 24.—The short, informal civil marriage of Prince Ernest August of Cumberland was completed at 4:30 this afternoon. Meantime the guests who were to attend the religious services had assembled in the royal chapel at the other end of the castle. The room was richly decorated with flowers and many royal personages and persons of high rank of all nations were present. The ceremony was beautifully impressive with dignified grandeur and when the rings were exchanged before the altar, a battery of artillery stationed outside the castle fired the royal salute. They were married under the rites of the Lutheran church. The ceremony seals a reconciliation between the deposed house of Hanover and the House of Hohenzollern.

A state banquet will be given at the castle this evening, followed by the historic "torch dance" and the distribution to guests of "souvenir" garters. These are in the form of silk ribbons, bearing the bride's initial and the date in gold letters, which modern delicacy has substituted for pieces of the bride's garter cut up and distributed by the prince of royal family on the point of their swords.

The bridal couple left immediately after for the emperor's hunting seat at Hubertusstock, north of Berlin, where they will pass the first week of their honeymoon, then going for a fortnight to the Duke of Cumberland's hunting castle near Gnuenden.

ROYAL WEDDING TODAY

German Royal Bride's Costume Kept Secret by Empress.

BERLIN, May 24.—Ending a week of brilliant festivity, participated in by royalty, Kaiser William's only daughter, Princess Victoria Louise, Saturday be married to Prince Ernest Augustine, of Cumberland.

Included among the guests at the function will be King George and Queen Mary of England, the Duke and Duchess of Cumberland, Grand Duke Constantine Constanovitch of Russia and his duchess, and the Grand Duke Dimitri, a grand nephew of the Duchess of Cumberland, mother of the bridegroom.

The city looks like a fairyland, being brilliant with electrical displays at night and waving banners by day.

Much interest centers in the costume to be worn by the princess. The Kaiserina commanded the work done by several firms, each of which had to sign an official document pledging the strictest secrecy and agreeing that no detail of the work should be given out.

But it is stated the clothing will be characterized by the quiet elegance displayed by the Kaiserin in all matters sartorial. By her expressed command a number of impoverished needlewomen have been engaged to work on the bridal veil of point applique and very expensive.

Following the wedding, the gown worn by the princess will be on exhibition in a Berlin museum.

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CURRY COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL

Gold Beach and Surrounding Districts Unite for Improving School Facilities

(Special to The Times.)

WEDDERBURN, Ore., May 24.—The first official high school in the history of Curry County will begin a nine months' term of school at Gold Beach on the second Monday of September, 1913. This is known as Union High School No. 1, comprising school Districts Nos. 2-3-4-10-11-12-13-14-15-16-17-18-19, organized under the Oregon High School law. At the general election in 1910, the county voted in favor of a County High School, but no place was specified, when the County Court came to pass on the question there was such a contest between Port Orford and Gold Beach, both of which had bonded to build new school houses that the voters never carried out the mandate of the people in that election. But the Gold Beach citizens were determined to have a High school anyway, and a special election was called last fall for a Union High school in above districts, which was carried by unanimous vote. The board met and bonded a tax for 1913, but postponed the beginning of school until regular school year began. At a meeting of the board this week, Prof. Wm. J. Kent, of Langlois, was employed to teach the school. Mr. Kent is from Denver University, Colo., and has been in Curry County for two years. He is one of the new comers who has been putting new life into Curry County in the last three years. Showing the school growth in 1910, Gold Beach had one-room school building which would not have been a credit to back woods district. The employed only one teacher. The bonded and built a modern \$1,000 school house. Last year employed two teachers, and this year will employ three.

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
