Injures Eye.—Alva Doll narrowly escaped losing his right eye this morning, while chopping kindling. In breaking one of the sticks a piece flew up striking him directly in the right eye and tearing some of the ligaments loose. Physicians were promptly summoned and hope to save the sight but say it was a very narrow escape.

Buys Strawberry Ranch.—A. R. Eneyart of Lakeside was in Marshfield yesterday enroute to Coquille, where he is moving his family to take possession of a strawberry ranch which he recently purchased. No More Back Stamping.—Hereafter letters will have no back stamp telling the date of the letter's arrival in the postoffice, according to instructions received by postmasters. The long, established custom of "back stamping" was decided to be a waste of time by the postal authorities, and its abolition is one of the national economies of the Wilson administration. The salaries of thousands of postoffice clerks will be saved because of this step.

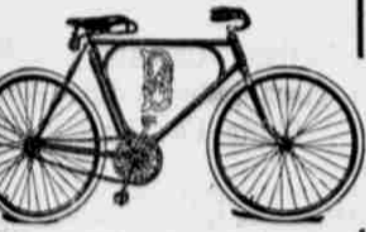
AMONG THE SICK.
