Start Improvements.—Superintendent Frank Smith, of the South Coos River hatchery, is arranging to erect a new bunk house and make other improvements at the hatchery within the next few weeks.

Meat Market Closed.—Tomorrow being a legal holiday and in observance of the Decoration Day custom, the meat markets of Marshfield and North Bend will be closed all day. They will remain open this evening for accommodation of customers.

Plan Service.—It is expected that the auto stage service between Allegany and Loon Lake will be put on within a few weeks. The road is being gone over now and put in condition for the service. The Vaughan autos will be used and Capt. Edwards will handle the river end of the service with the launch Rainbow.

Much Blasting.—W. J. Fellows, who is in from Ten Mile, says that Porter Brothers are rushing the work on the approach to this end of the big tunnel. They are using much dynamite and from early morn until late at night, it is one continual series of blasts. Mr. Fellows says that about 200 men are employed on the north side of the tunnel but not quite as many are employed on this end. The contractors have recently brought a large Columbia River type fishing boat there to haul their supplies in.
