#### EMPIRE MILL RUMOR.

Claude Hockett Says Report Was "Made Out of Whole Cloth."

George Hauptman, a retail lumberman of San Francisco, has returned to San Francisco, after a short visit with his old friend, Claude Hockett, of North Bend and Empire. Mr. Hauptman spent about a week on the Bay. He has some stock in some mills but is not actively engaged in the lumber manufacturing business.

Someone started a yarn in connection with his visit that he was going to take over the Southern Oregon Company's mill at Empire and operate it. Claude Hockett, who is the local manager of the Southern Oregon Company, as well as manager of the North Bend Box Factory, stated that "the yarn was made out of whole cloth." Mr. Hockett said that he supposed someone saw them going through the old mill and looking around, when he was showing Mr. Hauptman the sights, and then proceeded to "dream."

C. R. Smith, head of the Menasha Woodenware Company, and the Southern Oregon Company, is expected here next month to look after properties on the Bay. Mr. Smith

was expected here last month but was detained. He will probably be here to attend the annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Company, which will be held at Empire, June 26th. Mr. Smith has stated that his company will not start anything in the manufacturing line here until the Government suits affecting the validity of the old Coos Bay wagon road grant are ended.

The Southern Oregon Company has 50,000,000 and 100,000,000 feet of stumpage on the peninsula, but this is not sufficient to warrant them starting operations. Much of this has been logged over once. The Menasha Woodenware Company has considerable stumpage on the Umpqua and in that section but this will not be available until the railroad gets in.

Herbert Armstrong, manager of the Menasha Woodenware Company and Southern Oregon Company, stated today that there had been absolutely no negotiations for the sale or leasing of the Empire mill. He said that Mr. Hauptman while here and looked over the mill but had not made any offers for it.

## TALK OF NEW VESSEL HERE

The C. A. Smith Company is said to be considering plans for a new type of vessel for the Coos Bay service. The new vessel is to handle the coal from the Smith-Powers mine on Catching Inlet and also the product of the pulp mill and probably will do a general freight and passenger business.

Nothing definite has been done about the matter yet but it is said that preliminary plans have been submitted to some of the officers of the company. The vessel considered is to be somewhat smaller than the Adeline Smith, but will be speedier, the proposal being to equip her with 2,500 horse-power engines while the Adeline has only 2,000 horsepower.

The Smith-Powers mine will probably be producing 250 tons or more coal with a few months and the pulp mill will be shipping considerable stuff. The new vessel is to be planned especially for this service, the speed being a feature of the passenger service.

While nothing definite has been done about the construction of the new vessel, it is likely that definite steps will be taken soon.

## ROAD CASE TO BE CARRIED UP

Arguments Submitted Concerning Special Tax Levies —Other Matters Up

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist was here from Coquille today to present some final arguments before Judge Coke in the special road taxes case. The case from Road District No. 6, is to be made a test case and should Judge Coke decide against the county in the collection of these special levies, Mr. Liljeqvist wants to carry the District No. 6 action to the Supreme Court to determine the law in the matter. About \$150,000 in special road taxes hinges on these cases. John D. Goss appears in behalf of the timber owners and others who are protesting against the special road levies.

Mr. Liljeqvist has been informed that the referendum is being invoked on the county attorney bill which will mean that his appointment,

as well as the others in the state, will be held up for six months and the old law will be in vogue until the November election, at least.

#### Election in November.

Oregon will have an election next November, despite the general belief to the contrary. No officials are to be elected, but the Legislature provided that an election should be held so that the people could vote on all referendum and initiative matters that might come up following the Legislature.

#### Clear Out Resorts.

Mr. Liljeqvist is making arrangements to start a vigorous crusade against the resorts after June 3 when the new law goes into effect. Under it, the property occupied by resorts can be confiscated and more stringent penalties enforced making it easier to convict.

Some of the resort owners are said to be moving out now and disposing of their belongings.

#### Autoists Face Trouble.

Mr. Liljeqvist is also taking steps to enforce the state auto license law. Many Coos County owners are violating the law. Out of a list of 35 owners which Mr. Liljeqvist submitted to the Secretary of State, only three had paid this year's license. It is probable that a special agent will be in here soon and all autoists not having the 1913 numbers on their machines will be up

against heavy fines, ranging as high as \$200.

Mr. Liljeqvist is not certain that Forger Penwell will be brought here for his preliminary trial.

Mr. Liljeqvist has been unable to find out who Gust Erickson, who in the Swedish Consul claims died in this county some time ago, leaving a considerable estate from which heirs in the old country have received nothing, was.

#### ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The Westerner sailed this morning for San Pedro with a cargo of lumber from the Coquille mill which she took on at the Railroad dock. The Adeline Smith sailed at 6 o'clock this morning for Oakland. The Breakwater is due in early tomorrow from Portland.
