WANT TO MAKE ENGINE HERE

Plan to Organize Stock Company to Manufacture New Type of Gasoline Engine

Plans to establish a gasoline engine factory on Coos Bay to manufacture the new rotary valve gasoline engine which has just been patented by T. F. Bradshaw, of the Bradshaw-Kimball Company, are now under way. Messrs. Kimball and Bradshaw have had many handsome offers from Portland and Eastern concerns for the engine, which is pronounced by all the experts who have seen the working model to be far ahead of anything on the market.

Mr. Bradshaw returned yesterday from Portland and is enthusiastic over the reception accorded his invention by Portland experts. A number of local men who have seen it are very anxious to have the industry retained here because it is one that is certain of success and bound to grow into a big thing.

It will require considerable capital to handle the project and after talking the matter over with a number of leading business men, Messrs. Bradshaw and Kimball have decided to submit the proposition to a meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce to devise means of financing a company here. It is believed that it can be handled here as Messrs. Bradshaw and Kimball, in order to make it a Coos Bay proposition, are willing to make the best of terms with the company that takes it over, both of them going in on the new company.

The engine, aside from the big industry, would be a great advertisement for Coos Bay. The payroll would be large.

They have offers from Eastern automobile concerns for the automobile part of the engine and this can be disposed of outright or on a royalty basis and the marine end of the business retained here. But this can be worked out later.

It is likely that a meeting will be called within a few days to arrange for handling the proposition. Here are some of the advantageous points of the new engine:

"The cost of manufacture as compared to the present type of engines as estimated by one of the largest foundries of gas engines in the United States, ranges from 30 to 50 per cent less than the present type.

"Its efficiency, as compared to the present type, is slightly in excess at low speeds and runs as high as 30 per cent greater at normal and high speeds, all speeds based on actual piston feet travel.

"Its fuel economy is even greater than the present type, due largely to the fact that the valve action is absolutely positive and in exact relation to crank shaft at all speeds. A valve of this type never becomes leaky, carbonize of pit and never needs regrinding or adjusting.

"Its simplicity, as compared to the present type, is very pronounced. We eliminate from 60 to 90 per cent of the parts and adjustments and 25 per cent of the weight, not only making it much simpler to manufacture, operate and maintain, but making it as nearly "fool proof" as it is possible to attain.

"There are no reciprocating parts to this valve arrangement, thereby eliminating all noise and vibration which it is impossible to do with the present type of valve mechanism. The lack of vibration in a gas engine means long life and high efficiency."
