Gets Contract.—The Eastside City Council Saturday evening awarded the contract for the reconstruction of the dock opposite the C. A. Smith mill to Johnson and Larson.

Hit Log.—Capt. Harris in a trial spin in his new launch yesterday ran over a log near the mouth of Isthmus Inlet and did some damage to the craft. However, he was able to take the boat to Sumner last night.

Widow's Day.—Judge Hall is at Coquille today hearing applications for pensions for widows and mothers today, the applications being under the new state law, which goes into effect today.

Start Auto Service.—Captain N. J. Cornwall in a wire from Drain to The

Times today states: "The Drain-Coos Bay Stage Company are now running autos from Drain to Scottsburg. Cars will be put on the Allegany run as soon as possible."

Mill to Close.—The C. A. Smith Company will close down its Bay City mill tonight for a few days. The mill is being reconstructed and enlarged and during the shut down, some of this work will be completed.

Land Contest.—The land contest between N. J. Rust and R. B. Symington, involving a piece of land on Isthmus Slough near the Southport coal mine, was decided by the Register and Receiver in favor of Mr. Symington.

PLAN TO DELAY RECEIVERSHIP

Judge Harris to be Asked to Defer Action in Kinney Case for Few Weeks

The understanding today was that Judge Harris will tomorrow be asked to defer the appointment of a receiver for the Major Kinney properties until word is received from Judge Brunough, who is en route to London to confer with the English syndicate negotiating for the Kinney properties. It is expected that Frank Waite in whose mortgage foreclosure suit Judge Harris was expected to appoint V. E. Watters of North Bend as receiver, will unite in asking the postponement of the appointment of a receiver.
W. J. Wilsey will leave tonight for Portland in response to a message calling him back there on some business matters. He expects to return here in about five days.
Nothing else new has developed in the Kinney case today. Judge Harris will have his hearing at Coquille tomorrow morning.

ALLEGANY ROAD CASE DECIDED

Judge Coke Holds Special Improvement Tax There Valid. —Will be Appealed

Judge John S. Coke has handed a decision in the case of Road District No. 6, involving about \$6,000 special taxes voted for the improvement of the road between Allegany and Loon Lake, in favor of the county and against the Menasha Woodware Company, which was contesting it. The case was decided on a demurrer, but will be taken direct to the Supreme Court by John D. Goss, who represented the Menasha Woodware Company. It was made a test suit, several other cases involving the collection of special tax levies in various road districts in the county being held in abeyance until this case can be tried out. An effort will be made to have it advanced on the Supreme Court Calendar to obtain an early ruling. The special tax levy was attacked as unconstitutional and Judge Coke in ruling declared that he believed that matters concerning the constitutionality of a law should be left to the Supreme Court to decide adversely, his idea being that the lower courts should accept a law as constitutional until the Oregon Supreme Court decides it otherwise. The Allegany case is the latest of several attempts by residents of that section to get the road to Loon Lake, which is part of the through road to Scottsburg and Drain, fixed up for good service. While Judge Coke's decision is in favor of the county and Allegany people, the appeal to the Supreme Court will stop Sheriff Gage from collecting the taxes until the higher court has passed on the case.

North Bend Case.
The North Bend Hardware and Supply Company has won its suit to collect an old claim against J. Virgil Pugh, a former North Bend man, who went bankrupt during the Rapid Transit flurry here a few years ago. The North Bend Hardware & Supply Company attached a half interest in the First National Bank building at North Bend. The bank tried to stop it by setting up a claim that Pugh had transferred this interest to them prior to the attachment, but as the latter transfer had not been legally recorded, Judge Coke held that the attachment was valid. It is stated that the case will be appealed to the Supreme Court.
