## GOVERNORS IN SESSION NOW

### Western Executives Meet at Salt Lake to Discuss Development of Section

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) SALT LAKE CITY, June 5.—The annual conference of the Governors of the Western States opened here today for a three days' session. Mayor Park delivered an address of welcome as did also Governor Spry. Owing to the non-arrival of several of the governors, today's sessions in most part consisted of routine work of the organization.

For the purpose of discussing the development of the resources of the West a three day's session, executives of Oregon, Montana, Utah, Nevada, New Mexico, Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming will be held. Governor West, of Oregon, is president of the conference. Much regret is expressed because of the absence of Governor Johnson, of California, who is kept away by press of work resulting from the necessity of having to pass on many bills enacted at the recent session of the legislature, which demand his attention.

The Governors who responded were Ammons, of Colorado, Haines of Idaho, and Carey, of Wyoming. The conference elected Carey president and Oddie, of Nevada, secretary.

## KINNEY CASES ARE DELAYED

### Hearings and Appointment of Receiver Deferred Until July 1 for Wilsey

At Coquille yesterday, as was expected, a stipulation was entered in the Kinney cases providing for a continuance until July 1 to permit the Wilsey deal to take its course without interruption. Unless the Wilsey syndicate is then ready to close the deal, Judge Harris will appoint V. E. Watters, of North Bend receiver of the Kinney properties and appoint a referee to hear testimony in the Walte foreclosure suit and other proceedings so that a decision may be expected some time this fall. Between now and July 1, the understanding was that all motions, demurrers and dilatory matters in the cases be heard so that it will be ready for presentation of testimony on its merits before the referee.

No objection was made to this proceeding and Judge Harris agreed to it. The principals in the matter are mostly represented at Coquille. It was stated that July 1 would allow ample time for Judge Brunough to reach London and confer with the members of the English syndicate who are said to be figuring on buying the Kinney properties. W. J. Wilsey is expected back in a few days from Portland where he was called on another matter.

Mr. Wilsey said that Coos Bay is bound to develop rapidly in the next few years. With the coast line from Portland to San Francisco built, and he declares it will be completed within four or five years at the longest, he says Coos Bay will have big terminals and railway shops; its harbor will be greatly developed and he confidently expects to see other lines of railways in here by that time.

Mr. Wilsey and his syndicate have made heavy investments near Crescent City and he is expecting the Coast Line to develop that property also.

**Simpson Water Case.** The case of the Coos Bay Water Company vs. the Simpson Lumber Company for about \$28,000 damages for excess water used by the Simpson mills and other damages is slated for trial soon, probably will be next Monday. C. R. Peck will appear for the Simpson Company and J. W. Bennett for the Water Company.

## COAST REFUGE HARBOR PLAN

### U. S. Engineers Considering One for Northern California Coast at Present Time

Owing to the many attempts to secure Federal aid in fixing up the Port Orford harbor not only for commercial purposes but also as a harbor of refuge, the following from a San Francisco paper will be of interest: "Captain A. B. Barber, one of the United States Army engineers entrusted with river and harbor improvements in this district, is considering the advisability of constructing a harbor of refuge for shipping somewhere along the Northern California Coast where vessels in distress may run in and repair, or ride out a storm in safety.

"The Chamber of Commerce has furnished Captain Barber with a list of 145 marine disasters between San Francisco and Humboldt Bay since 1900. They ranged all the way from simple strandings to great calamities, with heavy loss of life, such as the wreck of the steamship Walla Walla, lost off Cape Mendocino, January 2, 1902, with 29 passengers and nine of the crew drowned."

#### Oregon Scottish Rite Session Opens in Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—For a three days' session, the twenty-eighth semi-annual reunion of the Scottish Rite bodies of Oregon met here today, P. S. Malcolm, head of the fraternity, in charge.

One of the features of the gathering will be the announcement by Mr. Malcolm of the wiping out of the bonded debt against the Portland property of the order, and Saturday the mortgage of \$55,000 will be burned with due ceremony. This will occur in the main auditorium and will be followed by a banquet.

## FINDS 12 EGGS IN BULL SNAKE

### A. R. Peterson, of Coos Bay, Makes Unusual Discovery at Monmouth Normal

MONMOUTH, Or., June 5.—A. R. Peterson, of Coos Bay, an Ocean Normal student, made an interesting discovery which gives some idea of the havoc wrought by snakes on the nests of China pheasants. While on "Cupid's Knoll" Sunday afternoon he caught and killed a "snake" measuring four feet eight inches. Peterson dissected the reptile and found its stomach resembling a cold storage plant, being full of pheasant eggs. All but two were removed unbroken, there being nearly a dozen whole ones.

Another interesting fact was noted that in some of the eggs the yolk had begun to yield to the whites, if snakes have such a weakness. Peterson is that the eggs are swollen and digested shell and all. Peterson skinned the snake and is tanning the hide, which will make a couple of hat bands.
