Work on Line.—Supt. Miller of the local railway reports good progress in the improvements on the local line and he hopes to have them completed by July 1. About 1,000 feet of track was changed and rebuilt near Johnson's Sliding and a new sidetrack is being put in at Myrtle Point. He thinks that in the Southern Pacific budget the Coos Bay and Myrtle Point line was allocated \$45,000 for improvements the next two years instead of \$4,500 which press reports indicated.
