

NEW PHARMACY LAW GOOD ONE

J. Lee Brown Returns From Session of Oregon Board of Pharmacy in Portland.

J. Lee Brown of the Brown Drug Co., returned Saturday evening from Portland, where he was in attendance at the regular meeting of the Oregon board of pharmacy.

The main features of the new Pharmacy Law that concerns all the people generally, said Mr. Brown, are, briefly, that all purchasers of poisonous drugs such as carbolic acid, strychnine, arsenic, corrosive sublimate, antiseptic tablets containing corrosive sublimate, aconite, oxalic acid, muriatic acid, sulphuric acid, nitric acid, chloroform, potassium cyanide, etc., must give a satisfactory statement to the pharmacist as to the purpose for which the article is to be used, and must sign his or her name in the poison register, giving such information and the date and hour of sale.

All narcotic or habit-forming drugs, such as morphine, codeine, opium, laudanum, cocaine and chloral hydrate can be sold on the prescription of a regularly licensed physician or dentist of this state only, which prescription cannot be refilled, and no copy or duplicate of same can be furnished by the pharmacist.

Violators of this section of the law are subject to heavy fines or imprisonment or both. The Oregon Board of Pharmacy is given power to cancel the certificate of any registered pharmacist who violates any section of the Pharmacy law, or when in the judgment of the Board they have forfeited their title to registration.

There were 84 pharmacists who took the state examination, making the session an unusually busy one.

Mr. Brown went out via Drain and returned via Roseburg and Myrtle Point. He reports the Roseburg road in good shape except for a stretch of 15 miles in the canyon.

HISTORY OF M. F. PLANT.

Story of Former Coos Bay Boat That Was Wrecked in Alaska. Concerning the steamer Yukon, which was wrecked on the Alaska coast last week and which formerly plied between San Francisco and Coos Bay as the M. F. Plant, a dispatch says: "The Yukon, under command of Captain Archie McKay, was bound from Good News, Bering Sea, to Puget Sound."

The Yukon, whose gross tonnage was 1238, was 295 feet long, 36 feet breadth, 25 in depth. She carried a crew of 35. She was built in 1879 at Philadelphia, and plied for many years between Florida and Cuba under the Spanish flag. She was first called the Cuba, then the Argonauta. Under American register she became Corca, then the M. F. Plant. Under the latter name she plied between San Francisco and Coos Bay and between Puget Sound and San Francisco. For the past few years she had been in the Puget Sound-Alaska service, mostly as a freight carrier. She was insured for \$130,000."

Along the Waterfront.

The Adeline Smith arrived in Sunday and will sail tomorrow for Oakland. The Nann Smith is scheduled to sail tomorrow from San Francisco for Coos Bay, bringing passengers and freight of the Redondo, which is still on drydock.

North Bend Takes Both Games in Double Header—Bandon Also Wins Two Games.

Before a crowd of nearly a thousand, North Bend yesterday defeated Marshfield twice in the double header on the North Bend grounds. The first game was a walkaway for North Bend, the final score being nine to one, but the second game was a better one, being four to five.

In the first game, Hull had Marshfield pretty much at his mercy, while North Bend found Johnson a little more freely and this coupled with some bad errors made the awful finish.

In the second game, Hull came to the relief of Maloney, who had got himself into a bad hole and pulled North Bend to victory.

All in all, it was Hull's day, his work being largely responsible for North Bend's victory. North Bend as a whole played better ball than they did a week ago, showing beneficial results from practice. Quite a bunch of money changed hands on the game, the Marshfield fans backing their team pretty strong and finding ready takers in North Bend. It is estimated that several hundred dollars were won by the North Bend fans on the two games.
