CHICAGO, June 16.—Maid servants in Chicago have formed a union and these "Rules for Mistresses" have been presented by the Household Workers' Association:

Wash your own dishes on the girl's day off—don't leave them for her to do when she comes back.

Give the girl a full day off every week, and every other week let it be Sunday.

Get dressed before 8 p. m., for no lady's maid will work after that hour.

Days off begin after breakfast, and breakfast will be served at 7:30 a. m.

If maids are out late at night a light shall be left burning for them.

Maids shall be given vacations after six months of service for the same family.

The mistresses were given until tonight to subscribe to the rules. If they fail, a strike is threatened.

### RECOGNIZES HUERTA NOW.

Germany Sends Formal Letter to Mexican Government.

## DOCTOR IN EAST REVIVES DEAD

Claims Remarkable Results From Transfusion of Blood.

NEW YORK, June 16.—Dr. A. L. Sorel of Fordham University has startled his colleagues by the publication of results obtained from transfusion of living blood into the veins of apparently moribund animals and human beings. Dr. Sorel, who is attached to the staff of the Flower hospital, has been experimenting for five years past.

"In a recent experiment at Flower hospital," said Dr. Sorel, "I pumped all the blood from a dog until the animal lay absolutely lifeless. For fifteen minutes I allowed the animal to remain without a spark of life. The heart had stopped beating and every function of life had ceased."

"I connected the blood vessels of the dog with those of another dog and permitted the blood to flow. Inside of five minutes there was a complete return of life, and the dog soon was yelping in an entirely normal way. Other experiments with dogs have yielded results as amazing."

"When the way has been found to connect directly with the left side of the heart, medical science will be able to restore human beings to life after all animation has been suspended, provided there is no organic trouble. The resuscitation will be effective in cases of gas or drug poisonings, hemorrhages and such diseases as typhoid fever and pneumonia. Sudden death by accident, when no vital organ has been crippled, will fall within the scope of the transfusion method."

"An experiment with a pneumonia patient was perhaps not as spectacular as those with animals, but much more gratifying in result. This patient was entirely without respiration from all known tests applied, and therefore, actually moribund to all human knowledge. When I made a transfusion of blood from a normal man through the jugular vein of the patient the return to life was prompt and recovery followed in due course."

"If such transfusions could be made promptly the loss of life would be materially lowered."

### MASONS IN OREGON.

New lodges A. F. & A. M. were formally indorsed at Langlois, Curry County; Redmond, Baker County, and at Montavilla. Reports showed an increase in the state during the year of 905 new members, making the total membership of 135 lodges now 12,315. It was announced that the grand lodge sent \$2412 to the cyclone and flood sufferers in Nebraska, Ohio and Indiana.
