Shad Plentiful.—Shad are reported more than plentiful in Catching Inlet. This morning one jumped on board the Millicoma on her down trip.

Will Move to Coquille.—Mrs. O. Lund is making preparations to move to Coquille, where she will make her home with her daughter, Mrs. F. C. True.

On Picnic.—Mrs. C. H. Dungan, assisted by Mrs. M. R. Smith, will entertain the A. N. W. Club Thursday at a picnic at the Dungan home on South Coos River.

Pulp Mill.—The C. A. Smith pulp mill will start operations soon after July 1. It will probably take two or three weeks to get the new machinery running properly and before

the plant can be operated at its full capacity.

Shingle Mill Starts.—The C. A. Smith Company's shingle mill, which has been shut down for two days while some changes and improvements were being made, resumed operations this morning.

Rush Barge.—Krusse & Banks are rushing the construction of the big barge for Porter Brothers and expect to have it ready for launching early in July. The barge will carry about 500,000 feet of lumber and will be towed from Florence to San Francisco laden with lumber from the Porter mill on the Siuslaw.

He reports they have started building their new camp near the shipyard. All of the work along there will be handwork, no steam shovel being used. There is a large amount of it.

Good Catches.—The deep set fishermen have been making fairly good catches off Coos Bay the last few days. Monday some good catches of halibut were brought in, one fish that Fourier Brothers got weighing about 125 pounds. Some blueback salmon have also been caught off shore. These fish are said to never come into the bay, although the other salmon do.

Enjoy Picnic.—Last evening the employees of the Golden Rule enjoyed a moonlight picnic at Knob Hill. Mrs. Copple and Mrs. Irish arranged it, and a most enjoyable evening was spent, supper being prepared in camp fashion and a huge bonfire making a center for the evening's diversions. Among those present were: R. A. Copple and family, W. F. Irish and wife, J. J. Morrow and family, Miss Laura Lawlor, Miss Ellen Brewer, Miss Esther Nelson and Mrs. Ida Patterson.

Big Elks Here.—F. E. Daniels, district deputy of the B. P. O. E., arrived here today via Drain to visit the Marshfield Elks' lodge tonight. He is on a tour of inspection. This afternoon, Secretary Rotnor took him out to the Smith mill
