WILL RUN EXCURSION.

Launches to Bring in Crowd for Lifeline Dedication Sunday.

The Rev. G. LeRoy Hall has arranged with the captains of the launches plying on the Inlets to run excursions here for the Lifeline dedication services Sunday afternoon. THE LA FRANCE CASE OPENED

Insurance Company Seeks to Recover Money Paid—Bandon Property Involved.

PORTLAND, June 19.—The Oregonian says: "An equity suit was filed yesterday in the United States Circuit Court by the Postal Life Insurance Company, one of the companies which J. C. LaFrance is charged with having defrauded. LaFrance, who, with his wife as an accomplice, was arrested at Bandon, Or., where he was engaged in the lumber business under the name of J. A. Ferger, is charged with having substituted a dead body for his own, which his wife identified as LaFrance and collected insurance from several companies.

"The suit filed yesterday has for its purpose the compelling of the disclosure of the present ownership and manner of acquisition of property owned by LaFrance and presumably purchased by him with the money fraudulently obtained, which was later assigned to other people.

J. J. LaFrance; Emily L. LaFrance, his wife; John B. Cleland; G. T. Treadgold; J. C. Wofford and the Modern Woodmen of America are named as defendants.

"J. C. Wofford, who is LaFrance's brother-in-law, appeared before Bean yesterday and testified to the manner in which a sawmill at Bandon, supposed to have been purchased by LaFrance with the insurance money, was transferred to him.

"Wofford came to Bandon from Louisiana at the solicitation of Mrs. LaFrance, his sister. He said he asked why LaFrance had changed his name, but that he was not told.

"Wofford is contesting the claims of the insurance companies to the mill on the grounds that he was an innocent purchaser.

"He was represented yesterday by G. T. Treadgold, a Bandon attorney, to whom he mortgaged the mill for \$3000 after it had been seized by officers, following LaFrance's arrest.

"Judge Bean set July 3 as the date for further hearing of the case."
