THROWS SELF UNDER HORSE

English Male Suffragette Commits Suicide on Race Track—Stoops American Horse.

The Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. ASCOT, England, June 19.—Fired by the example of Miss Emily Wilding Davison during the Epson derby, a male suffragette committed suicide today by flinging himself in front of August Belmont's four-year old Tracery, during the race for the valuable Ascot gold cup. His act deprived the American sportsman of a good chance of capturing the trophy. The man, whose name is believed to be Hewitt, was fatally injured. Suffragette officials say the man is unknown to them. The man was killed on the spot but the horse and the rider, although both were brought to the ground, were not harmed.
