They have had an expert going over the situation and will have the new system in for use this fall.

**Third Man Buncoed.**—A North Bend Greek appeared before Justice Pennock today and stated that Bill Paulos, the Greek who is wanted here for obtaining money under false pretenses by selling his half interest in the O. K. chop house to two different men, had also sold the interest to him and received a payment of \$100 on it. Sheriff Gage left this morning for Drain to bring Paulos back.

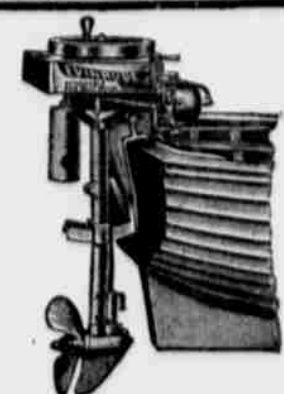

**Coquille Pioneer Dead.**—The funeral of Mrs. J. L. Roy, of Coquille, who died yesterday, will take place tomorrow at 10 a. m. under the auspices of the Eastern Star, in which organization both she and her husband have taken a prominent part during their long residence in Coos County. He being present at the institution of the grand chapter in Oregon. They have made their home on a ranch near Coquille for the past 30 years. Besides her husband Mrs. Roy is survived by two married daughters. Several members of Doric Chapter C. G. S., including Mrs. J. T. Hall, will go to Coquille tomorrow to attend the services.

**Profit From Cow.**—J. A. Goodwill, of South Coos River probably has established a new record for the profit from one cow. During the month of May Mr. Goodwill received a check from the North Bend condensary for \$23.46 for the milk from the one cow. She furnished about 1600 pounds to the Condensary and in addition to this sufficient milk and cream for the family, amounting to at least 200 or 250 pounds more. Last spring, Mr. Goodwill thought of selling the cow and offered her for \$90, but the party refused to give more than \$75 and now the profits from her for one month more than equals nearly one-fourth the value he placed on her.
