

MYRTLE POINT ROAD DISCUSSED

Roseburg Good Roads Association Receives Detailed Report-Bay Road Hit

The Roseburg Review says: "At meeting of the local Good Roads Association last evening a report was submitted by Engineer L. G. Hicks on the conditions of the Camas Valley-Coquille road. The report goes into the matter in full detail, accompanied by blue print maps and photographs showing the terrible condition of this so-called road. Also estiof this so-called road. Also esti-mates of the cost of its improvement with a correct surface and with as-phalt macadam. Engineer Hicks and three other members of the As-sociation went over this entire piece of road and have gathered a great deal of data relating thereto, includ-ing timber and other property val-ues. They have also had a test made by the state authorities of the rock there, which is pronounced of good quality for road improvement work It is said this rock can be had in sufficient quantities for this road building work. A survey has also been made by County Surveyor Frank Cain for the proposed relocation of this road so as to eliminate the heavy grades and his findings are also included in the report.
"In part Mr. Hicks say

Importance of This Road. "The importance of this Camas Valley-Coquille road is very great. Douglas county, with its peculiar sa-lubrious climate, can grow and ma-ture crops of vegetables and fruit and grains which cannot be grown in the

coast country. A large market for Douglas county produce in Coos county swaits the coming of the good roads over which maximum loads can be hauled. On the other hand, fish, cranberries, butter, cheese and other produce could be brought from Coos to Roseburg, the market town, if road conditions were improved.

"At the present time, the United States mail is carried from Roseburg to Coquille and Marshfield over the present road, there being two stages per day each way. The passenger traffic will average 15 persons per day or 5475 per year, which at \$6 a person gives \$22,850 paid for stage fare per year. fare per year.
"From Roseburg 1400 pounds of

nead leaves for the coast each day, or 511,000 pounds per year, while 800 pounds per day, or 29,200 pounds per year are brought into Roseburg over this road.

"The road from Roseburg to Marshfield via Sitkum is a road of almost prohibitive grades, and will never receive the traffic that the Myrtle Point road will have. The Sitkum road is a mountain road and nothing more, and while for scenery passed through it surpasses the Myr-

passed through it surpasses the Myrtle Pöint road, yet its summit elevation reaches nearly 1000 feet higher. "The present route, known as the Camas Valley-Myrtle Point road, is a through route from Roseburg westward to Myrtle Point. Leaving Roseburg, the road winds up the river to the new steel highway bridge at Winstein, then turns to the southat Winstons, then turns to the south-west, passing through large orchard tracts to Brockway, thence westward through fertile fields and valleys to Olalia. From Olalla the road climbs over Camas mountain, on a planked roadway to Camas Valley, but I am informed that the present road loca-tion is not the best that can be ob-tained as regards summit elevation. From Camas the road enters the Co-quille river canyon and follows this for a distance of some 16 odd miles to Myrtle Point in Coos county. Present Conditions of Road.

At the present time we know no other road in any worse shape than this one under consideration. "I have personally walked from the Camas Valley end of this road down the canyon to a point west of Sheep Camp, and I have seen the dif-ficulty to which traffic is being sub-

jected.
"Ruts in the road on measurement show 30 to 42 inches in depth and the bottom of the ruts dry. It appears as though it is a case of lack judgment or funds that would allow a road, important as this road is, to get in this condition. I show

herewith a few small snap-shots which will give an idea of the condition of the road surface over which traffic is supposed to pass.

'It takes four horses to pull a driver and three or four passengers. In the winter time during the rainy season portions of the road are well nigh impassable. This has been so year after year in the past.

I found a great deal of the road had pends of water standing on it June 1, 1913, and that some of the muddlest spots were on the bridge

"Bridges were found that were un-safe, railings gone and bents leaning in a dangerous manner.

"Parts of the road at points where the Coquille river was from 60 to 100 feet away, nearly straight down, have dangerous holes cutting through the outer rim of the road. have

"Summing up, the physical condi-tion of this road could not possibly

be worse.

"An approximate estimate of the cost of constructing asphaltic macadam on the road under consideration is \$1.80 per square yard, or \$9504 per mile, or \$82.209.60 for paved surface for total length of road. Comparison shows that planking would cost approximately \$20.039.54, with a life not to exceed five years. The asphaltic macadam would prove to be better, more lasting, and will show better, more lasting, and will show by its installation a tendency to line up to the present instead of using the methods of the past.
"The approximate estimate of the

cost per square yard of this class "A" concrete pavement would be \$1.75 or \$9240 per mile.

Conclusions, "That rock of suitable nature can

be found in close preximity of the Camas Valley-Coquille road is the opinion of the writer, backed by the opinion of the state geologist.

"That to construct a plank road over this road in question, would be

mistake, a step backward, not ahead.

'That an asphaltic macadam con-structed under proper specifications, with rigid inspection is the choice of the writer.
"That an intelligent road location

be started at once, is conceded by all who are familiar with the situation to be the proper procedure, even if plank were to be used.
"That a state geologist be employed at once to ascertain the loca-

tion of suitable rock in the vicinity of this proposed road improvement. That immediate steps be taken

by the County Court plans, specifications, call for bids and let contracts on this road improve-ment work of a durable and perma-nent character, is, I believe, the wish of the Good Roads Association of Douglas county,

"The local Good Roads Association Tuesday night decided to present the matter as contained in this report to the County Court just as soon as practicable and urge that the recom-mendations be followed as to build-ing a permanent hard surface road there, instead of a plank road as con-templated by the court."
