# "A MILLION FOR MISSIONS"

### THAT'S THE MOTTO OF THE RECENT CONVENTION OF THE SEVENTH DAY ADVENTISTS.

During the past four years the Sabbath schools of the Seventh-Day Adventist denomination in North America gave \$632,778.30 for the furtherance of the gospel in foreign lands, according to a report rendered by Secretary George B. Thompson, before the delegates at the world conference of Seventh-Day Adventists in Washington, D. C. An extract of this report has been received by Grace B. Lewis, secretary of the Sabbath school of the local Adventist church, and the members were much interested in the progress mentioned in it.

During the quadrennial period of 1905-1908, the Sabbath schools gave \$273,141 to missions, the increase over this amount during the quadrennial period ending in 1912 being \$359,636.

The motto adopted at the session of the general conference just closed, for the coming four years was "A Million Dollars to Missions." The report further showed that in 1908 the denomination had 3747 Sabbath schools, 1260 of which were in foreign fields and 2478 in America. During the four years of the general conference period, the schools had grown to 4457, of which 1845 were in foreign lands, and 2614 in home fields, making an increase of 574 foreign and 136 home Sabbath schools, since the last general conference. Four years ago there was a membership in these Sabbath schools of 88,843, of which 22,011 were in the foreign fields. During the quadrennial period there has been an increase in membership of 25,170, of which 23,678 has been in foreign lands and 1492 in the home fields, the membership in the foreign fields having doubled during the past four years.

During the four years 2542 of the Sabbath-school scholars have been converted and most of them baptized. Since 1867, when the first deposit for missions was made by the schools, they have donated \$1,313,550 for missions. The record of offerings to missions in 1912 from the Sabbath schools was said to be especially encouraging, as during the year \$228,029 was given, which was an increase of \$71,540 over 1911. Four years ago the Sabbath schools of the denomination were giving less than \$2000 a week to missions; now they are giving almost \$5000 a week.

The members of the local Sabbath school are especially interested in the recommendations made to the general conference, which are as follows:

That attention be given as never before to make the Sabbath schools a great power in saving souls; that some plan be devised at this conference which will result in increased study of the lessons; that the Sabbath school workers' training-school be continued; that the officers of the Sabbath school be elected the same as other church officers and serve for one year instead of six months as at present, and that the secretaries for the Sabbath school work in the various conferences be chosen who can give their entire time to that work.

# Paris, the Incomparable

"LEARN ONE THING EVERY DAY"

### No. 6. ARC DE TRIOMPHE.

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THERE is nothing more dazzling in history than the rise of the young lieutenant of artillery, Napoleon Bonapart, to the title of Emperor of the French, the period of 19 years elapsing from his winning the former rank to his elevation to the throne. And from that time on the great soldier-emperor found time to do many things besides fight battles and win victories. He did much for the city of Paris, and it has been said that he never considered a victory complete until it had been commemorated in some



colossal figures. On one side are the Rising of the People in 1792 at the Summons of War; and the Triumph of Napoleon after the Austrian campaign. Above is the surrender of the Turks at Abukir. The bas reliefs on the frieze represent the departure and the return of the troops. On the opposite side are groups representing the resistance of the French to the invading allies in 1814 and the Blessings of Peace, and above the Taking of Alexandria. The battles of Austerlitz (1805), and Jemmappes (1792), are shown on the ends, and there are thirty shields on the cornice wreathed with the names of victories. No less than 142 other battles are named on the vaulting of the principal arch.

The location of the Arch of Triumph is no less wonderful than the monument itself. On high ground, it stands at the end of the Champs-Elysees, the splendid drive and promenade of Paris, down which one may look for a mile and a half to the Place de la Concorde, the whole forming the most magnificent section of any city in the world.

It is a commentary on the instability of power that the Arch of Triumph, begun to celebrate the victories of Napoleon, witnessed in 1814 the coming of the armies of the allies to celebrate the downfall of the emperor, and they marched beneath the partly completed monument to drive Napoleon into exile. lasting monument. The Arch of Triumph, or more correctly the Arch of Triumph of the Star, from its position as the radiating point of 12 beautiful avenues, is one of the monuments begun by Napoleon to celebrate his victories.

It was finished by Louis Philippe, 15 years after the emperor's death. This monument is the largest and most magnificent arch in existence. The whole monument is 164 feet high. The immense pillars supporting it are adorned with trophies 36 feet high, in which are
