ARNOLD IN TROUBLE.

Amusement Man Given Some Amusement by Wife.

The following from a Portland paper will be of interest here as Arnold was here a few years ago with his carnival attractions. "Elijah J. Arnold, proprietor of the Arnold Amusement Company, is being sued by his wife, Elizabeth Arnold, for \$50 maintenance, and she asks that he be compelled to pay off a mortgage on their home, 945 Belmont, and a judgment against him. Mrs. Arnold alleges that he represented in 1908 that they were married in 1908 that he had \$50,000 in property. She charges now that he got away with \$1200 or \$1500 that she had when they were married, and now refuses to pay more than \$25 a month which the County Court ordered him to pay for her support. She asks that he be enjoined from leaving Portland with his show outfit until the suit is settled.

THE LIFELINE IS DEDICATED

New Gospel Boat Formally Started on Its Mission Yesterday—Many Present.

An audience of about 200 yesterday witnessed the dedication of the new Colportage boat, the Lifeline, on the waterfront. The weather was threatening and probably detracted considerably from the attendance but the audience was an enthusiastic one and gave the new gospel boat an auspicious start on her work.

Rev. A. F. Bassford presided at the meeting. The Rev. C. H. McKee, of McMinnville, Rev. Geo. L. White, of Portland and Rev. O. C. Wright, of Portland, occupied positions on top of the cabin of the Lifeline, while the audience lined the dock and cabins of the surrounding launches.

Miss Alpha Mauzey presided as organist for a number of selections, some by a quartette and others being hymns in which the entire audience joined.

Rev. J. E. Burkhardt in behalf of the local pastors extended a greeting to the Lifeline, saying that he felt sure that the boat and Rev. Hall would occupy a field of religious work that needed attention. He said it would carry the gospel to families and men who were now denied, through distance, the privilege of worship.

Rev. Geo. L. White, of Portland, representing the American Baptist Publication Society, under whose auspices the Lifeline will be conducted, delivered the dedicatory address. He spoke of the growth of the Pacific Coast, showing the various states had almost doubled in population the last ten years and were badly in need of a corresponding religious development. He said that there were over 40,000 people in Oregon who were not near enough to churches to attend services. He said that besides the Lifeline here, they have a colportage boat under construction at Puget Sound to serve there and the Netherlands, another colportage boat, was recently purchased for religious work along the rivers in California. However, the Lifeline is the first-chapel boat to be put in commission.

There was scripture reading by the Rev. McKee and dedicatory prayer was by the Rev. O. C. Wright of Portland. Rev. Hall offering the benediction.

Mayor E. E. Straw, who was to have spoken at the dedication, was not present. The program closed with a dedication hymn written by M. Harvey Yager, of Ellensburg, Washington.

Following the program many inspected the little craft.

BANK ROBBER IS STILL FREE

Think Ray Diamond Heading Toward Coast in Curry County to Leave on Ship.

REWARD FOR DIAMOND INCREASED TO \$500.

ROSEBURG, June 23.—Sheriff Guine was officially notified today by President Rothermel, of the Glendale bank, that the surety company had increased the reward offered for Ray Diamond, the bank robber, from \$200 to \$500. This reward is to be paid as follows: \$200 for the arrest and conviction of Diamond, and \$300 for the recovery of the money stolen. Nothing has been heard today as to Diamond's whereabouts.—Roseburg Review.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 23.—Officials of the Glendale State Bank have received a telegram from the bonding company in which they carried insurance against loss by burglary, that they had increased the reward offered for Ray Diamond. As the reward now stands \$200 for the arrest and conviction of the fugitive and an additional \$300 for the return of the money secured from the bank at the time of the holdup.

Although the country is fairly flooded with circulars containing a description of the desperado nothing has been heard from him since he was sighted by a forest ranger late Wednesday afternoon near the Looney mines on Walsley Creek. Notwithstanding, however, the officers are confident that Diamond will eventually leave the heavily timbered mountain districts and seek refuge in some coast city. Wherever his temporary destination may be he will probably attempt to board a boat and leave the country for all time.

In addition to the circulars recently sent broadcast over the country Sheriff Guine is preparing a new circular which is more in detail, and bears a most excellent likeness of the fugitive. Like the other circulars, these will be sent to every officer on the coast. While it is generally conceded that Diamond is making his way toward Gold Beach or some other coast city, Sheriff Guine has made preparations to block his flight in the event he should retrace his steps and attempt to get back to the line of a railroad. In all, the officers believe that Diamond will find difficulty in escaping unless he stays in the mountains for a sufficient time as to allow the search to lag.

SPAIN JOINS PEACE RANK
